### Thirty Rounds of Boxing Will Be Offered

A casual inspection of the card reveals such names as Jack Crim, Bobby Allen, Able Gordon, Wilbur Harrington and Dick Stephenson. All the fans have seen these boys in action and know that as soon as they step into the ring there is a slugfest from the opening gong to the knock-out count.

### Main Event Good

The main event is between Ted Frenchie and Carl Floyd, who are newcomers but who pack a mean slug in either fist. Opinions differ as to what will be the most exciting bout of the evening, the Jack Crim-Bobbie Allen six round slug fest or the fight between Wilbur Harrington and his time honored rival Dick Stephenson of Merrill.

### LLOYD DeLAP IN SISSON

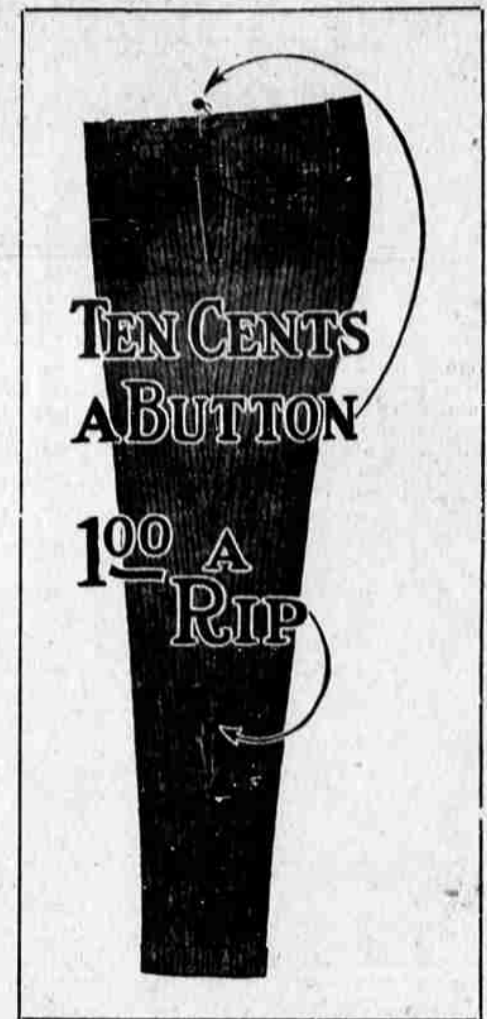

### Episcopal Church To Build Shortly

At a special meeting of the building committee for the new Klamath Falls Episcopal church, held last evening, with the arrival of Bishop Remington of Pendleton, erection of the new house of worship, on the corner of eighth and Jefferson streets, will start in the near future, adding to Klamath Falls one of the most modern of the smaller churches in southern Oregon.

In the neighborhood of \$12,000 will be spent on the building. Plans from the architects, Laurence and Holford of Portland were brought

to the city and accepted by the building committee.

As yet no definite announcement has been made as to who will be pastor of the new church. Rev. Oliver Riley of North Dakota, who was to fill the vacancy left by Rev. Merryweather, being unable to accept, due to being kept in the east.

Local contractors bids will be called for just as soon as specifications are returned to the city, with plans to have the building completed before the holiday season.
