L. B. Rockwood, U. S. entomologist from the Forest Grove station, C. C. Wilson, of the U. S. Bureau of entomology at Sacramento, Calif., and B. C. Thompson, assistant to the chief of the entomology department at O. A. C. who were called here by Sexton and Chorpening to aid in curbing the infestation, have left for their various homes, satisfied that the pest is practically under control.
