would be located within six or eight miles of the center of the city. We wish to get as close in as may be practicable but it is impossible at this time to name a more specific location.

All these plans and promises are as definite as we can make them just at this time and are, of course, predicated upon the assumption that our applications are approved by the Commission, without destructive competition; and the support of Klamath Falls for our program is assumed.

Supplementing the foregoing statement of our work as planned, it will be noted that not only will Klamath Falls become a very considerable railroad center, but that through our lines will be able to reach substantially all of the markets of the United States for its products with direct service. Locally it will be connected with all its tributary regions where railway service can be justified. It will be one main trunk line between North Pacific coast points and California. It will be on a through line between Portland and Western Oregon and the east; this line will give direct service to the east for the Klamath region.

With the very great natural resources of this region under development, direct railway service to markets, and the establishment of important terminal activities here, Klamath Falls is assured of a bright future and, it seems to me, has the right to feel optimistic.

May I, in this connection say I think we should not overlook the great development coming to this section as a resort region; to my mind your possibilities in that direction are as yet not comprehended. We will be glad to cooperate in making them known.

Elliott To Take Office Tomorrow; Caleb Jones Out

For the fourth time in seven months, the guiding hand on the reins of the district attorney's office will change. This afternoon Caleb Jones, who for the past month and a half has been the acting-district attorney, retires in favor of E. L. Elliott, who was appointed to succeed William N. Ganong, resigned.

Mr. Jones has been busy today arranging matters in the office in order that Mr. Elliott may assume his duties with everything in running order. He will take an office in either the Odd Fellows building or the Loomis building. His deputy David R. Vandenberg, who also retires this afternoon in favor of W. A. Wiest, will take an office in the American National bank building, adjacent to the office of W. H. A. Renner.

Mr. Elliott assumes his position as district attorney for Klamath county tomorrow morning and with Mr. Wiest as his assistant, will attempt to carry on the work of law enforcement at the point where Mr. Jones left off.

The history of the district attorney's office since January 1 has been varied. William N. Ganong, was elected district attorney at last November's election, and chose W. P. Myers as his deputy.

Several months after Mr. Ganong took office, he was forced to leave for a governmental hospital in Walla Walla for treatment for tuberculosis. Myers was left in charge as acting district attorney. He chose David R. Vandenberg as his deputy. Last month, Myers resigned and was replaced by Caleb Jones. Vandenberg was retained as deputy.

Then District Attorney Ganong resigned, early this month and his place was filled by Mr. Elliott who appointed Mr. Wiest as his deputy.

Visitor Here From Panama Canal Zone

An interesting visitor in Klamath Falls, who arrived yesterday, is Miss May L. Smith, sister of Willard Smith of this city, who arrived on the western coast from Balboa Heights, Canal Zone, Panama, on the 27 of this month and will visit here at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Smith for about three weeks. This agreement to go into effect August 1, 1925.

The dairymen of this city are losing many dollars each month through people refusing to pay the milk man. Therefore we are forced to ask everybody to pay cash in advance, as in other cities, for the milk we deliver.

We will consider the 15th of August as the last date for cash settlement for the month of August. Thereafter we will expect all accounts to be paid for on the first of each month. If accounts are not paid by the 10th of each month we will discontinue the serving of milk and notify the credit association of our action that all dairymen in the city may know.
