FEDERAL AID TO IRRIGATION IS SOUGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1. (AP)—Plans for a concerted drive upon Washington, D. C. to obtain federal aid for the development of the Columbia Basin Irrigation Project were outlined at the reorganization meeting of the trustees of the project league held today in the chamber of commerce. Most important of the steps taken was the appointment of F. M. Goodwin, former secretary of the interior as the Washington representative of the league. He will give his entire time to the task of obtaining action from the department of the interior and from congress for the development of the project. The next important step was the appointment of Fred A. Adams as secretary. He will have no assistants in his office. This action was deemed necessary for economy. Adams has recently held the position as educational director. Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: President, Harvey Lindley, Seattle; vice presidents, W. L. Boise, Portland; J. W. Langdon, Walla Walla and Earl Forman, Sand Point, Idaho. President Lindley appointed as an executive committee Roy R. Gill, Spokane; J. W. Langdon, Walla Walla; Samuel H. Hedges, Seattle and J. W. Laird, Pocatello, Idaho. The water allocation in Idaho, Washington, Montana and Oregon which was necessary in the plans for the development of the project were discussed by Roy R. Gill and Fred A. Adams. They explained that efforts are now being made to have state commissions appointed to handle this matter, meet and prepare a report on the entire distribution of water involved before the coming session of congress. It was explained that such a report will give information relative to the amount of water needed for irrigation and for power purposes and will be of great importance in the presentation of the entire project plans before congress.

Riffian Leader Loves To Fight

PARIS, Aug. 1. (AP)—If Abd-El-Krim, leader of the warring Riffians in Morocco had rather fight than negotiate for peace the French and Spanish are ready to accommodate him. This was the effect of a statement made today by Premier Painleve of France. The premier declared that the French marshal, Petain, and General Primo De Rivera, head of the Spanish military dictatorship, reached an agreement at their recent conference in Morocco for joint Franco-Spanish operations against Abd El Krim, if he prefers to fight rather than to negotiate. M. Painleve intimated the combined offensive will take place soon. This is supposed to mean the French desire to finish the Moroccan campaign before the rainy season which commences in October and during which military operations will be almost impossible.

Christian Church At Pleasant Hill Now 76 Years Old

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 1.—Members of the Pleasant Hill Christian church will celebrate the 76th anniversary of the founding of the church Sunday. Elijah Bristow, one of the earliest settlers of Lane county, built the church in 1850. It is believed to be one of the oldest in the Willamette valley. The church built by Bristow was also used as a school house until 1875. In that year a chapel was built, and this was used until 1913, when the present church building was constructed.
