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Contractor Will Top Surface Soon

By the end of the week, the last load of base course rock on the 17 mile stretch of The Dalles California north of Sand Creek and south of Corray Springs, will have been dumped and spread on the road bed, according to J. F. Cameron, supervising engineer for the Bureau of Public roads, who was in town today conferring with officials of the state highway department here.

Then, after several days are spent in changing the screens, the contractor will start laying the top course.

Mr. Cameron expressed complete satisfaction with the progress of the work and looked forward to the letting of the contract for the grading of the last unfinished gap of the Cross state highway.

with an application by the railroads of the northwest, to increase the rates and on the other by the Hock-Smith resolution in congress, which urges that a general investigation of all railroad rates in the United States be conducted with the view in mind of effecting a general reduction of agricultural shipping rates.

Mr. Corey and his party plan to remain in Klamath Falls for a week or ten days.

Will Make Report Just as long as it takes us to make a personal inspection of all the railroad surveys, will be the length of our visit," Mr. Corey said today. "We must make a report to the Interstate Commerce Commission on our findings in order that they as well as we can check up on the reports of the railroad companies with the findings of our engineer."

Mr. Corey said that he expected that hearings of the Interstate Commerce Commission on expansion of railroads in central Oregon would be held next October. Mr. Corey's stand in favoring the extension of the Union Pacific from Crane to Odell, has not been changed since his last visit; and he stated that the matter would probably come up before the commission hearing next October.

Mr. Corey also said that he was just as much in favor of the southern extension of the Oregon Trunk as ever and that he was confident that the building of this railroad would be effected.

Haynes Loses Federal Post

Prohi Commissioner Is Stripped of Some Powers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3. (AP)—Dry enforcement today was ordered to be taken definitely out of the hands of prohibition commissioner Roy A. Haynes, who after September 1, will act only in an advisory capacity to assistant secretary Andrews of the treasury.

Commissioner Blair of the internal revenue bureau, who has jurisdiction over the prohibition unit, signed the decree which stripped the present enforcement headquarters of its major powers. The order which had been forecast, will carry out the treasury's plans for a new lineup when the prohibition reorganization plan goes into effect the first of
