New Addition Is Killed in Council Room

Refusal of K. D. Co. to Grade Brings Divided Vote

Unwilling to approve an addition to Klamath Falls unless the Klamath Development Co. agreed to grade streets, two councilmen refused to accept Dixon Addition No. 2. They were Fred H. Cofer and E. H. Balzinger, while C. I. Roberts and C. E. Stuckey voted for the new addition.

A representative of the company pointed out to the council that grading the streets would entail such expense that the property would not be salable.

Another residence section in the city came into being last night with the creation of Homeacres a 25 acre tract south of town, which was accepted by the city council. Forty more acres will be included in the section pending inspection by the county court of the acreage.

Persistence won its reward last night and Western Union messenger boys were allowed seven-foot parking space in front of the telegraph office, following an oral plea for a short restricted space. The four boys who appeared before the city council were Oris Sweeney, Charles Eaton, Roy Durham and George Belton.

The usual time was devoted to the passage or consideration of ordinances.

Ordinances adopted last night were: Ordinance to appoint C. N. Coseboom, city architect for the public library; paving of Payne alley; approving se-sale of certain land to F. Hill Hunter; re-sale of land to Oscar Holm; paving of Washington street from Seventh to Eighth; Lincoln street from Eleventh easterly to the Linkville cemetery; Jefferson street from Ninth easterly to the Government canal.

PUBLIC SERVICE MEN MEET WITH PUBLIC BODIES

An investigation of crop production, both present and potential, and the market for crops, prompted members and officials of the public service commission this morning to meet with the directors of the Klamath Irrigation district and the Klamath Federated Board.

In both meetings the state men made it clear that they were in Klamath to ascertain whether or not agricultural conditions in Klamath would stand an increase in railroad rates or a decrease. On the one hand the railroads are petitioning the interstate commerce commission for an increase in rates and on the other, a resolution is on record in congress asking that an investigation be conducted with the view in end of effecting a decrease in railroad rates for agriculture.

Both the directors of irrigation district and members of the federated board endeavored to show why the railroad rates for farm products should not only not be increased, but a decrease would help farmers secure a reasonable profit from their land and spur them on to greater agricultural development.

FOREST FIRE WORSE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 4.—The forest fire on Cedar Swamp creek, in the Mount Hood National forest, was reported worse today. It now covers an area about a half mile wide and one and one half miles long, the forest supervisors office reported.

Mystery Surrounds In- jury to Two in Gun Fight

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Aug. 4.—Two men, both dangerously wounded, were in a hospital early today here and in Long Beach, and

two were held by the police of the two cities for investigation as the result of what officers say was a pitched battle in Long Beach between rum runners and hi-jackers.

The wounded were Jake Barret, alias Jack Collins, San Francisco, located in the Seaside hospital, Long Beach, and C. H. Munson, Los Angeles, found in the Clara Burton hospital here. The two in custody gave the names of Jack Martin, San Francisco, and George L. Bruneman, Los Angeles. Martin was arrested when he

dashed into the home of a Long Beach police officer, a mile from the scene of the shooting, and asked for water.

Bruneman, according to the Los Angeles police, brought Munson to the hospital here.
