

DEMPSEY TO BE SUSPENDED FOR FAILING TO BOX

Heavyweight Champ Will Lose His Crown in the State of New York

NEW YORK, Aug. 4. —Though failing to take any further disciplinary action against Jack Dempsey, for his alleged dilatory tactics in agreeing to fight Harry Wills, the New York state athletic commission decided it would suspend any boxer who meets the champion anywhere before he signs a contract and posts a forfeit to battle the giant negro challenger.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—Jack Dempsey's heavyweight pugilistic throne is being brushed and polished for a new occupant.

Steps to suspend the champion for his failure to appear in New York and accept the challenge of the negro, Harry Wills and plans for an elimination title series to elect his successor, engaged the New York boxing commission yesterday.

Dempsey himself was unable to appear to defend himself orally. He has written the commission asking its indulgence in his delays, resulting from the straightening out of his business affairs with Manager Jack Kearns, but word went forth last night that the days of grace for the champion had reached an end.

Anticipating the dethroning of Dempsey today, as well as the commission's approval of a "championship" battle between Wills and Gene Tunney, promoter Tex Rickard has already taken preliminary steps to stage a contest between the challengers this fall.

Rickard says that Dempsey positively will not fight this year.

Micky Walker, welterweight champion, who was slated yesterday to accompany Dempsey back into the ranks of the New York Ineligibles because of his failure to arrange for the defense of his title against Dave Shude, today was in Chicago, training for a fight with Billy Wells. Loss of his title in New York is no new thing to Walker. "He has been dethroned before on the same count."

Bids For Poultry House Will Open Wednesday 7 p. m.

At a special meeting of the Klamath county fair board called for 7 p. m. in Room D, court house, sealed bids for the erection of a poultry and pet stock pavilion at the fair grounds will be opened Wednesday evening, August 5th. Bidders have three ways to bid on this job, either for labor alone, the board to furnish all materials; for labor and materials on a wooden structure or labor and materials on a structure whose roof and sides are of corrugated steel. Equipment for the interior of the poultry house is already on the way from a manufacturing cooping concern in the middle west whose specialty is the housing of poultry and pet stock. Bids received for such construction by local carpenters was far in excess of the collapsible wire cages that are so easily disinfected after shows and fold away in small storage space.

GOITER CURE IS GIVEN BY MEDIC

Girls of West must use More Iodine, Declares Government Chemist

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4. (AP)—Half of the girls living in a belt extending from New York to the Rocky mountains have incipient goiter and the number so afflicted is increasing with the growth of population, declared Dr. J. W. Turentine of the United States department of agriculture in a paper presented today at the seventeenth meeting of American chemical society which is being held here.

This increase might be checked, Dr. Turentine said, if growing children were given a daily portion or four-millionths of an ounce of iodine. The readiest form in which this may be taken into the system is seaweed, one thousandth of an ounce of dry algae or seaweed contains the essential quantity of iodine. The same result may be obtained from eating 2 1/2 ounces of oysters, 24 ounces of sea fish, 200 ounces of fresh water fish, 200 ounces of eggs, 440 ounces of lettuce, 500 ounces of milk or 2400 ounces of wheat.

"These figures," explained Dr. Turentine, "show how difficult it is to plan a menu from ordinary articles of diet which will provide adequate quantities of the essential iodine."
