**Lawyers Start
 Fight to Save
 Russell Scott**

**Sanity Hearing Under
 Way to Fix Slay-
 er's Sanity**

CHICAGO, Aug. 4. (AP)—There will be no testimony of phantasmic butterflies and lions in the evidence of the alienists upon whom the defense relies to save Russell T. Scott from the gallows.

The effort to prove that he has become insane since he was sentenced to death, and therefore should not be hanged, will be confined to the story of his sixteen months in jail, his career and ideas. The state will try to show that he is mentally cognizant of his position and the penalty he faces.

The jury which will decide his fate had this outline before them in the opening statements of the defense and state. His guilt or innocence is not even a remote issue.

Indication that speed would be the constant endeavor of Judge David, whose writ for a sanity test saved Scott from the gallows, came yesterday when a jury was selected in four hours.

**Academy Prepares
 For Another Term**

**Sisters of St. Francis Outline
 Plans and Course of Study
 For Year**

The announcement of Sacred Heart Academy of Klamath Falls, appearing in this issue, will be of interest to those who are looking for a select boarding school for their daughters or young sons. Sacred Heart Academy is conducted by the Sisters of St. Francis, primarily for the religious education of the Catholic children of Klamath county and vicinity. It nevertheless receives non-Catholic children and nothing is said or done to influence the religious beliefs of the latter. It is the aim of the Sisters to train the child to grow to true manhood or womanhood. The discipline is kind but firm, and special attention is given to the etiquette of the children and habits of industry inculcated.

As last year was so successful in the amount of work accomplished and results obtained, a still more successful year is anticipated by the faculty and preparations are being made accordingly.

As has been announced before, the grades follow the same line of work as the public schools. In penmanship nearly fifty per cent of the pupils received Palmer penmanship awards, and great improvement was observed during the year. The eighth grade classes take the state examination. The class of last June obtained the highest marks in the county and received well merited praise from the county superintendent.

The high school is standardized and offers work along the same lines as any high school.

Music and art are special features at the Academy. In music the university course is taught. It is a course highly recommended by northwestern authorities in music, such as Frederick W. Goodrich of Portland and others.

In art there is a stricter adherence to nature than is found in most of the moderns. Both departments are in the hands of very capable instructors.

The Academy is pleasantly located in the heart of the city. The building is a three-story tile structure, well lighted and ventilated, and surrounded by ample play grounds. About nine hundred dollars worth of equipment have been added this summer for the greater comfort of classes during the coming year.

LEPSIK, Aug. 4.—For the first time since the founding of the Gewandhaus concerts in 1781 a visiting orchestra, the Saxonian State, will be included in the season's program. The extraordinary duties imposed upon the Gewandhaus orchestra by the reconstruction of the Leipzig municipal opera has caused the city council to curtail the concerts.

The Gewandhaus orchestra will be available for only 18 concerts during the season, while the Saxonian State will be heard in two.

He came to the west when he was nineteen years of age and has been a resident of eastern and southern Oregon ever since. In 1877 he married Mary Roberts and to this union were born two children, John and Pearl McFall. Mrs. McFall died when the children were young and years later Mr. McFall married Allee Wimer. To this union there were born four children, Earl, Clarence, Lottie and Wilma McFall. In addition to being survived by the above children, Mr. McFall is also survived by two step children, Ethel Roberts and Burley Pinton, and two brothers; Russell and Jim of Missouri. He had been a resident of Poe valley for 14 years and was widely known and respected throughout the county.

The largest expansion program in the history of Dodge Brothers, Inc., is now in progress.
 Continually overhauled since the business began, and particularly this year in spite of the fact that production has been consistently in excess of 1,100 cars a day, the management is determined to take extraordinary measures to meet the requirements of its dealers in 1926.
 Five large new buildings are already under construction and three others will begin immediately, it is announced by F. J. Haynes, president and general manager.
 The total floor area of the eight new buildings will exceed 3-4 of a million square feet and will afford employment for several thousand additional men. The cost of the expansion will be at approximately eight million dollars.
 When the present construction program is completed, on January

1, 1926, Dodge Brothers, Inc., will have a capacity of 1,600 cars a day. The present intention is to go into full production on this basis the moment the new facilities are available.
