

## Pickerings Acquire 5770 Acres of Timber in Modoc County; Development Seen

In discussing with Ross Langill, chief engineer of the Prescott company, Menamiee, Michigan, the question of equipping band head rigs with variable speed motors in order to be able to control the speed of the saw, Mr. Langill said: "Our company equipped six six-foot band mills and two six-foot horizontal re-saws in the plant of Ford Motor Co., at Iron Mountain, Michigan, with variable speed motors. These motors being direct connected to the lower wheels of the machines. The speed range was approximately 50 per cent and was obtained by the use of direct current motors. Some such arrangement is a necessity in eastern hardwood on account of the timber being frozen for about one-third of the year and exhaust speeds in the winter must be diminished accordingly. The Sugar Pine Lumber Co., of Fresno, Cal., installed variable speed motors on their band head-rigs and have found the result very satisfactory. In Michigan and Wisconsin and Minnesota, where mired timber is sawn, the same results are obtained by direct connecting the motor to a jack shaft and belting this motor to the cutting unit. Two or more pulleys of different sizes are placed on this jack shaft so mounted that any of them can be put into use in a change-over period of fifteen or twenty minutes. In mills arranged in this fashion soft wood logs are usually separated from the hard wood and sawn separately and the speed set accordingly. The cutting result obtained are not equal to those obtainable by direct connection because the slight variation in speed caused by belt slippage has some effect on the cutting qualities of the saw."—The Timberman.

Call's Poolroom has been remodeled and many improvements made in the building.

The Oregon hotel, a neat two story eighteen room building is owned by Mrs. K. West and was built a little over a year ago.

The three garages, Markwardt Bros., Square Deal and L. and R. are all new buildings.

Hotel Ballour is a neat stucco building, replacing the frame hotel which burned several months ago.

Klamath Supply has an up to date modern brick building. They handle a general merchandise stock and they carry out their slogan of "make your dollars have more cents."

Chiloquin laundry owned and operated by Mrs. H. Perham is also a new building.

J. Hossig owns the building now occupied by the Klamath Tel. and Tel. Co., but later plans to replace this with a brick building.

The Davis Furniture store was built this spring by Mr. and Mrs. Claude Davis and their business has increased to such an extent that fifteen feet are at present being added to the building.

Chas. Snook's gas and oil station also shoe shop was built a few months ago.

An attractive gas and oil station and building at the intersection of the highway and Main street this spring this was put up by Fay Mitchell.

A new three room brick school house was constructed here two years ago, and the town has grown to such an extent that an additional room is to be added at once.

Two new grocery stores have opened in the last few months, Harris Cash Store on Main street and Elmore's Quality on Choekatoot street.

About thirty attractive bungalows and ranch home appeals to the working man, and now that two new box factories are in our district and a big modern electrically equipped mill promised in the near future,

with the assurance of work that these industries bring, people no longer hesitate to build their own homes.

The Glenger building is nearing completion. Their grocery store is open and one of the stores are occupied by the Golden Rule. The apartments will soon be ready for occupancy.

The Chiloquin theatre owned by Harry Poole of Klamath Falls is to be remodeled soon and comfortable seats installed.

Mr. and Mrs. Burton own the Chiloquin cafe, a new stucco building.

Bell's Stage office are headquarters for Cal's stage line and Bell's Taxi service.

The Fitzgerald building has been remodeled and painted and is occupied by Hill and Gardner's poolroom, Grob's meat market and Power's barber shop.

G. W. Brown is erecting a double store building of brick and Columbia tile.

This is indeed a new town and while there has been talk of incorporating no definite steps have been taken. Our town is a typical western town and we would not have it otherwise, our lumberjack with his cut off overalls, the Klamaths with their ten gallon hats and high heel boots. They one and all take civic pride in the betterment of our community.
