A Hydro-Thermograph has been installed by the Fremont National Forest office which records the temperature and relative humidity for each day. This instrument is a valuable aid in determining the seriousness of the fire risk in the forests, in as much as the danger is known to be much greater when the humidity is very low. Last Sunday, August 2, the humidity was so low during a part of the day that it could not be recorded on the chart provided, which would mean that it was below ten degrees. The information shown on this chart is read three times a day by the use of a sling psychrometer, and a telegram is sent to the Weather Bureau in Portland each day at noon, advising that department as to the atmospheric conditions existing in this locality.
