## INDIANS GIVEN HIGHEST PRAISE

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7. (AP)—James A. Branagan, of Philadelphia, put the Indian on a pedestal of science at the American aborigine society's sessions here today with the declaration that the American aborigine was the first chemist on this continent.

The Indian, said Branagan, knew nothing of chemistry and geology as we understand these terms, but he was quick to take advantage of chemical combinations and geological conditions in his surroundings.

To prove his point, the Philadelphian cited his method of making flint arrowheads, spears and knives by using a piece of bone scoured or soaked in ashes and water. He also pointed to the Indian's ability to tan hides, make glue from fish scales, water proof canoe seams with pitch, temper clay for pottery and dye his clothes.

### JAPANESE MOUNTAIN CLIMBERS TO EXPLORE CANADA

TOKYO, Aug. 7. (AP)—Under the joint auspices of the Tokyo Nichi Nichi, the Osaka Mainichi and the Japan Mountaineering society, an attempt will be made by a party of Japanese mountain climbers to ascend the heretofore unsurmountable peaks of the Canadian Rockies. The party, which will be captained by Mr. Maki, one of the leading mountaineers of Japan, will include representatives from the Peers' School and Keio university. Final preparations will be made at Vancouver.

The climbers will start out from Jasper with 30 horses and a number of native guides and a base camp will be established at the foot of Mt. Columbia. The party is expected to be away about three months.

### BULGARIA MOVES TO PREVENT FOOD PROFITEERING

SOFIA, Aug. 7. (AP)—Minister of the Interior Russeff has directed the chief Commission of Provisions to begin proceedings against fruit and vegetable merchants in half a dozen cities to compel them to sell their produce at reasonable prices. Complaints had been made that prices three times as large as they should be were being charged. Some milkmen, who were said to be charging excessive prices, also were included.

The provision authorities were instructed by the minister not only to fine those found guilty of profiteering but to impose prison sentences of one year as well.

### Veterans of 20 Years Organize

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6. (AP)—Corporal H. W. Roberts post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, has a condition of membership that probably is unique. No veteran is eligible unless he has served at least 20 years in the army, navy or marine corps. He must, of course, have put in part of that time in foreign territory to comply with the general requirement of the V. F. W.
