Examinations For Naval Academy To Be Held Shortly

THE DALLES, Ore., Aug. 7.—(Special)—Congressman N. J. Sinnott has announced that he will appoint the Midshipmen to Annapolis in 1926 on the basis of a competitive examination. This examination will be held on Saturday, October 24, 1925, in the following cities in the Second District of Oregon and will be conducted by the United States Civil Service Commission: Pendleton, La Grande, Baker, The Dalles, Klamath Falls, Lakeview, Hood River, Enterprise, Prineville, and Bend.

The candidate receiving the highest rating in this mental test will be appointed as Principal by Congressman Sinnott. The candidates rating next highest will be appointed alternates. Examination will be conducted in the following subjects: Algebra, plane geometry, English composition and literature, United States history, Ancient history and Physics (Science). Rangers Warned of Imminent Lightning Storm Next Sunday

A telegram received this morning from the United States weather bureau warned the Klamath Forest Protective association that weather conditions tomorrow, Sunday and Monday would be so called "bad fire days."

The telegram stated that not only would humidity east of the Cascades be low, but also that weather conditions in other sections indicated that a lightning storm might strike the Klamath country Sunday. It is from lightning that the majority of fires in Klamath county start. The forecasts of the U. S. weather bureau were found to be authentic, rangers of the forest protective association say.

GASOLINE TAX IN WASHINGTON TON BUILDS GOOD ROADS

TACOMA, Wash., (AP)—The highways of Washington have received \$6,175,300 from the state gasoline tax since August 31, 1921. The tax now is two cents gallon, having been raised from the original one cent levy. At present the yield from the tax is close to \$250,000 monthly, a sum sufficient to pave 10 miles of highway that already has been graded.

All money from the gasoline tax is used to build roads. This fund and license fees from automobile drivers have been largely responsible for the improved highway system in the state.
