LET 'EM PAY THE TAXES

Published elsewhere in this issue is a statement showing the amount of taxes paid by the eighteen lumbermen who have gone or record as opposing the entrance into this territory of the Oregon Trunk railroad. What do you think of it? Compare this statement with your own and then you will understand why you pay so much.

One reason for the general public demand for the Oregon Trunk is based upon the realization that its coming means greater development, and greater development means lower taxes. Look at the published statement and you will understand why lower taxation holds no attraction for the names on that list, for they are now so low that common decency demands that they be reduced no lower.

Since these companies have gone on record against further development and consequently in favor of maintaining the high standard of taxation that has been bearing down upon the shoulders of the property owners of the city and county, let us go on record in favor of making them pay their portion of the tax that they evidently have been escaping. Instead of paying approximately \$40,000 a year, they should pay over three times that amount, if they are placed on a par with the other taxpayers of the county. If they consider themselves so important that they can undertake to stop the coming of another railroad, let the taxpayers of the county consider themselves of importance enough to undertake to make these self-appointed obstructionists carry their share of the cost of governing the city, county and state; of maintaining our highways; of supporting our schools.

The entire tax paid by these eighteen lumber concerns is not sufficient to pay a fraction of the cost of maintaining the additional schools made necessary by reason of their operating here. Yet, they stand up and tell you you can't have another railroad.

Let our slogan be "More railroads or more taxes!"

Magistrate of Crescent To Be Arrested Soon

Because he refused to make a fur dealer's report, despite warning by District Game Warden Marion J. Barnes, Justice of the Peace F. M. Cleaves of Crescent must answer to state authorities.

A warrant was sworn out this morning by Barnes for Cleaves' arrest and an officer will be dispatched to consummate the arrest either today or tomorrow.

Cleaves, who has been Justice of the Peace of the isolated Crescent section of the county for several years, is also a fur dealer, trading with Indians and trappers in that vicinity. According to Barnes, the county peace officer had been advised of the regulations governing fur dealers.

"When the state game commission still did not receive the report after the warning, they wrote me a letter to arrest him on the charge," Barnes explained this morning.

LUMBER GRADER BUMPS INTO CAR OF M. M'ANDREW

An attempt of C. Sivertsen to pass another car on a curve at Urrman store on the Dalles-California highway, led to an accident in which Sivertsen crashed into the large sedan of Martin McAndrews who was coming the other way yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Sivertsen, who is a lumber grader at Lamm's Mill, was driving north and McAndrews toward Klamath Falls. Damage to the McAndrews car was not so serious that he could not drive into Klamath Falls.

Sivertsen was arrested by County Traffic Officer Knowles on a charge of reckless driving and will be given a hearing before either Judge Bunnell or the temporary Justice of the Peace, this evening at 6 p. m.

The flight was in a direct line toward Cape Thomas Hubbard, but everywhere ragged country and ice were found. Another flight further to the south, was made in the effort to locate a base.

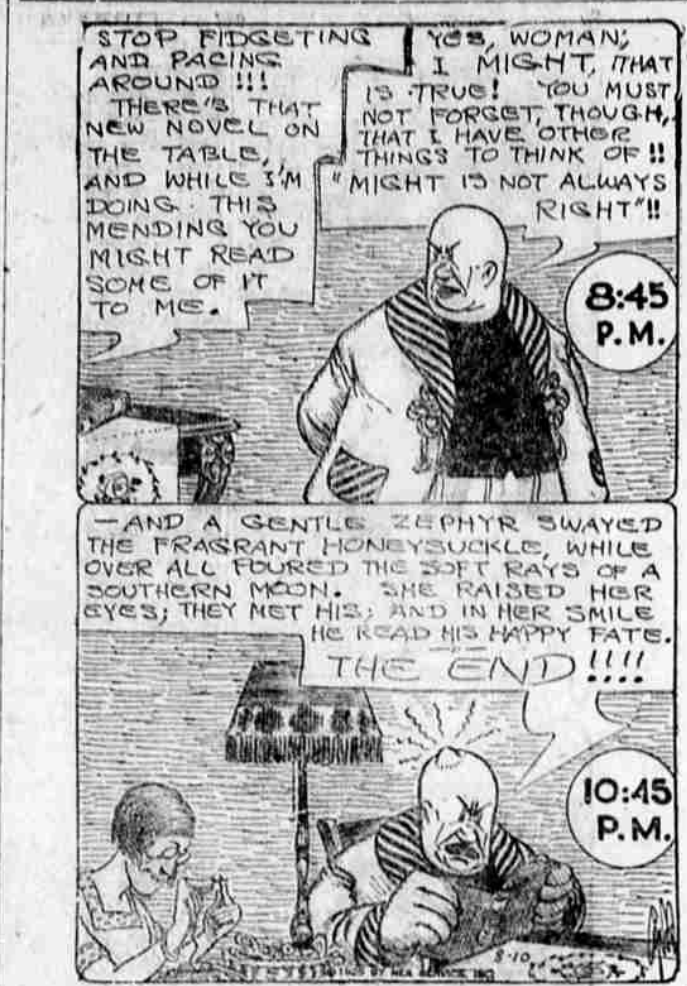

Speeders Beware Now that Judge Is Ever Present

With Ed Kendall assured of the temporary position of Justice of the Peace, activities in checking up on speeders on state and county roads will be increased according to W. A. Foster, state traffic officer. "My hands were tied, with Hunsaker being sick most of the time," the officer said. "I couldn't hold tourists in town several days awaiting a meeting of the county court, so that Judge Bunnell could levy the fine. "And inasmuch as I was letting off the tourists, I could not very well hold the speeders who lived here in the county and could answer the summons when Judge Bunnell could hear the case. "But now it is different. I understand that Kendall has received the appointment of Justice of the Peace and then I can be assured that there will be a magistrate in the Justice court to hear my cases."

New Poultry House May Not Be Built

New Poultry House inside 18 Because there are no funds available for the work, the construction of the poultry house at the fair grounds this summer will probably not be effected, according to R. E. Bradbury, chairman of the board, this afternoon. Bids for the job were opened last week, and Cook & McCoy, contracting firm, was the lowbidder, with an offer of \$1065 for the job. If by Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock, funds could have been secured, the contract with the low bidder would have been signed. But when it appeared that not sufficient funds for the work were available, the project was, temporarily at least, abandoned.

Ground Is Broken For New Building

Ground was broken today for the new W. O. Smith building on the corner of Fourth and Klamath. W. D. Miller & Co., with a crew of men started to excavate on the property preparatory to laying the concrete foundations. Work will be pushed rapidly, and by the late fall will be ready for occupation. Coter Bros. were awarded the contract for the construction of the new building.
