

ESTABLISHMENT OF CITY STREET DISTRICT ASKED

County Court Will be Urged to Aid Klamath Falls on Improvement

AUTHORITY IS CITED

State Law Permits Creation of District Within Municipal Limits

The rampart of the so-called "deaf ear" of the county will be assailed by the city council this week for the purpose of extracting money.

With the law as their authority, the street committee, the mayor and the city attorney will ask the county court to create a county road district within the boundaries of the city.

With this district in existence, the county could levy between \$12,000 and \$15,000 additional funds for road purposes. The law states that 70 per cent of these funds must be used within the boundaries of the city and that the remaining 30 per cent can be utilized by the county court as it sees fit.

Balsiger Proposal
The movement found its source in Councilman Elmer Balsiger. The city, which faces the need of financing many city improvements, has no funds to defray their expense. Mr. Balsiger investigated the proposition of a city road district and found it feasible.

The county court had been approached by a member of the city council on the proposition, but had not expressed any opinion on the matter.

To Probe Charge
An investigation into a certain discrepancy between the bill of W. D. Miller for rock laid on Michigan avenue and the report of the street commissioner, will be conducted this week. Mr. Miller is charging the city for 16 yards more than the report of the street commissioner shows.

"I know positively that my man, Billy Baird, checked every load of gravel that was dumped", J. A. Uerlings, street commissioner said. "Well, we will investigate the

matter", Charley Roberts promised. Buy New Truck

Bids were opened for the purchase of a truck for the fire department. A ford truck was purchased from the Balsiger Motor car company, the lowest bidder.

Providing that it is handled satisfactory to the fire chief, the Warren Construction company has the sanction of the city council to utilize the water from fire hydrants for the purpose of wetting down streets before paving.

Death knell of any more paving projects for the city this year was sounded last night when a petition to pave Washington street from the bridge crossing over the U. S. canal southwest to the end of the street, was 'laid on the table' indefinitely.

Too Late Now
"We have undertaken enough improvements for one year," councilman Stuckey commented. "Besides it would be difficult to get the project through before snow flies this winter."

And the rest of the council concurred in this stand.

But it did look favorably on a petition to establish street and sidewalk grades on both sides of sixth street from Jefferson to Washington and on Washington to Sixth to Seventh street. Residents of that section contemplate laying cement sidewalks this fall. The petition was referred to the street committee.
