GOOD-BYE, GOVERNOR PIERCE

The clock of the Pierce administration has struck twelve. The Governor might just as well turn his political ambitions over to the undertaker and arrange for their decent burial. No more need he travel up and down the state with alfalfa dust on his shoes and wheat straw in his hair. He is through and the sooner he realizes this fact, the sooner he will begin to arrange for his return to his white faced calves.

The sentence that produced all of this comes as a result of the announcement of the Klamath News—or should we say the Copco News?—that it has joined the ranks of the "independent republican" papers. Why this change has occurred it is difficult to explain. It would seem that the hand of death rests heavily upon its body—it never had a soul—and in the hope of revitalizing it, its progenitors are seeking this novel method of trying to revive its fast ebbing life-spark by the use of this political saline solution. But that it may reach the eyes of the reading public of Klamath county, let us give you some of the high lights of the "brilliant editorial" that passed sentence upon Governor Pierce, an "editorial" that appeared in the issue of the 11th yesterday:

"Previous to this morning's issue of the Klamath News, the paper has displayed little, if any, of its own personal or political views. However, we have had them. and they are going to come out as occasion requests."

"After donning the cloak of the Coolidge administration, this 'independent republican' power company advocate, hands this to Governor Pierce:

"Governor Pierce's administration has been, AND CANNOT HELP BUT CONTINUE to be a dismal failure. True, he has not had support. Perhaps he might have done better had he had the unity a governor and his subalterns should have, and the News is confident that unity can only be attained through republican leadership."

Would this change of heart have occurred if the governor had not taken such an active interest in the cancellation of the permit that was issued to the California Oregon Power company by the state engineer for the use of the waters of Link river? Has this change of policy been dictated from the home office over in Medford? Has not the policy of the News been dictated by the Power company home office ever since the paper entered the daily field? Is not the antagonism to the Goddard administration, so manifest at every opportunity, been directed by the powers in control of the California Oregon Power company because that official has steadfastly refused to be the tool of that corporation?

Oh! yes, it is a nice thing to be an "independent republican" newspaper—provided you get what you want. Evidently some "independent republican" promises have been made—promises that will assure the Power company the theft of the water rights of the farmers, the maintenance of higher water and light rates and the absolute control of this entire community.

It is fine to be "non-partisan" and "independent" when someone else foots the bill.

Livestock Men Get Big Price For All Sheep

Operators to Realize Over Half Million Dollars

From the sale of lambs to California meat dealers, Klamath sheep operators will realize approximately \$260,000 in cash this fall, was the estimate made this morning by Charles F. DeLap, sheep buyer for the Union Sheep company of San Francisco.

Sale of wool to Boston wool manufacturers brought to Klamath operators the sum of \$320,000, this year. Thus the total cash value of wool and lambs shipped from Klamath this year is approximately \$580,000.

The Union Meat company has contracted for 20,000 head of lambs at about \$7.50 a head, or 175 car loads that will be shipped for the most part during October. The Golden West Meat & Packing company has contracted for 4000 head and the Roth & Blum company has contracted for 2000 head.

It is estimated that 35,000 head of lambs will be shipped from

Klamath to various Pacific coast points, where they will be slaughtered for market.

Many sheep operators are saving their young ewes for breeding purposes next spring.

BIG BOND ISSUE IS UNDER PROBE

Town of Oreno Prints \$900,000 Worth of Paper, is Allegation

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—District Attorney Stanley Myers said today that he had asked city officials of the town of Oreno, in Washington county, to bring their records to his office for an investigation he is making of a bond issue authorized by the town of \$50,000 for a water system and \$400,000 for streets, sewers and other general purposes.

Myers' investigation was prompted by a warning issued by the Better Business bureau of Portland to the public against purchase of the bonds. Some of the bonds have already been sold, according to Myers. The district attorney's investigators said they had learned that \$900,000 worth of the town's bonds had been printed.

Farm Crops Man To Conduct Tour In Wocus Valley

An investigation and analysis of crops of reclaimed marsh land in Klamath will be conducted next Friday afternoon by E. R. Jackman, farm crops specialist for the Oregon Agricultural college and a noted authority on crops.

An invitation to all farmers who are interested in this phase of farming of Klamath has been issued by the county agent's office and those wishing to accompany the tour must be on hand at the court house at 1:30 p. m. Friday.

Owing to the diversity of crops grown and its proximity to town, the five thousand acres of peat land in Wocus valley has been selected as the land for investigation.

Particular attention will be paid to the lettuce crop in the valley which was undertaken for the first time this year.

Mr. Jackman will meet Saturday afternoon with the Klamath Potato Growers association and discuss with them problems that have arisen in the cultivation of this year's crops of Netted Gem potatoes.
