LOST RIVER CANAL IN USE FIRST TIME

Clogging of Diversion Channel Causes Irrigation Officials to Reduce Load

For the first time this year, water is flowing from Lost river down G canal and irrigating farm lands on the east side of Lost river.

The diversion channel which carries water from Lost River and diverts it into the Klamath river, has become weeded and clogged to such an extent that it was felt that it could not carry the entire load from the river.

So Herbert D. Newell, project manager, this week ordered that the water from Klamath lake serving the east side of Lost River be shut off, and that water be turned into G canal from Lost river, relieving the heavy load in the diversion channel.

How long G canal will be used this year, Mr. Newell could not say. Peak of the load carried by the main irrigation canal was reached last month and records show that the load has dropped from a high mark of approximately 800 second feet to between 400 and 450 second feet. Usage of irrigating water will be on the decrease now until the close of the irrigating season.

Measurements made of the depth of Klamath lake show that the average volume of storage water for the past 20 years is being impounded.

Although below the average, the inflow of water into the lake is far above the inflow of last year. Irrigation officials ascribe the light snow fall in the eastern part of the county as the reason for the inflow being below average this summer.

Farmers Blamed For Accident on 11th and Main

A 'turn right' in the middle of the intersection of Eleventh and Main streets was used as a 'turn left' by John Cherekoff and Dave Kudenow Tuesday afternoon and the result proved to be a smash-up in which H. F. Hatton, 2215 Garden avenue was the recipient of the smash, according to a complaint filed yesterday.

The two men, who are of Russian nationality and farmers of Poe valley, were arrested yesterday by Patrolman Harold Collins and Deputy Sheriff Lor. Burke at Bonanza and brought to Klamath Falls to await a hearing today on the charge of intoxication filed against them by Hatton.

Hatton stated to authorities that he was driving west on Main street toward the Eleventh street intersection and that the two Russians were close behind him.

When he had arrived at the intersection the two Poe valley farmers drew up along side, turned to the left of the turn right and then swinging to the right crashed into his car, Hatton claims.

Kudenow, who is said to be the driver of the car, will be prosecuted for driving while drunk while John Cherekoff will probably be prosecuted for intoxication.

EX-LEGISLATOR TO LOCATE HERE

Klamath Falls looks mighty good to D. E. Fletcher of Independence, Ore., and he is thinking seriously of coming here to locate permanently.

Mr. Fletcher is a "retired" legislator; that is, he was a representative from Polk county in the 1923 session, but one term was enough and he decided to call it quits. In spite of the pleadings of his friends he refused to stand for re-election. During the 1923 session Mr. Fletcher was chairman of the house ways and means committee, and had the reputation of being one of the hardest working law makers at that session.

He will remain here several days looking over prospects, and expects to decide to east his lot with Klamath Falls and its future.

Road Engineer to Investigate New Road Improvement

Should the project prove feasible, the mile and one half of tortuous, bumpy road from Chiloquin to the Forest Lumber company will be graded and surfaced with gravel before winter.

Frank Z. Howard county road engineer, within the next few days will investigate the proposed improvement, which a committee of lumbermen and citizens of Chiloquin brought to the attention of the county court last week.

If the project is under taken by the county court, an attempt will be made to finish the work before snow flies this winter in order that vehicular traffic between the mill and Chiloquin can travel between the two points without difficulty.

It is known that the county court regards the improvement favorably and would be willing to undertake the project providing sufficient funds can be raised and the work finished before winter.

Officers of the mill notified the court that unless the road was improved, a commissary store would be established at the mill which would be a severe blow to Chiloquin merchants depending largely upon the lumber industry of that section for their trade.

Many Attending Revival Meetings

There is an old time—a very old time—revival being conducted at the corner of Eighth and Klamath streets. Dr. A. G. Garr is the evangelist. Mr. Wilson, who has sung with many of the great evangelists of the east, with a tenor of unusual range, is the song leader and soloist.

Dr. Garr is a daring preacher, and evidently a daring believer. He preaches the Word of God, as Peter and Paul preached it, and Wesley and Finney. He does not believe it has lost any of its efficiency for saving the soul or healing the body.

Large crowds gather from night to night to hear this new-old Gospel. Many have professed salvation. Not a few have been prayed for for healing of their bodies and have testified later that they had been healed. Several claim they had been given up by physicians as incurable. These people evidently believe they have received relief through the prayers of Dr. Garr, and are enthusiastic in their newfound convictions.

Dr. Garr says that there is not a shadow of doubt but that the Word of God teaches divine healing for today, as for the age of the Apostles and before. He has thrown out a challenge to anyone who will take the Bible and show where God ever said or intimated He would remove the gifts of healing from the church, or that He would cease to hear the prayers of His people for their afflicted bodies. As He said to men of old time, He is saying to them today: "All things are possible to them that believe."

Dr. Garr is a man of wide travel and experience, having preached in Europe, Egypt, China, India, etc. He is of striking personality; a logical, interesting and convincing speaker.
