### Father Testifies In Girl's Trial

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14. (AP)—Joseph Ellingson, father of Dorothy Ellingson, the 17 year old girl who is charged with the murder of her mother, resumed the witness stand at the second trial of the young matricide today. He testified that Dorothy's mother had been mentally unbalanced for several months before the child's birth and also that Dorothy herself had not been normal for several years past.

On cross examination, Assistant District Attorney Harmon Skiles read from the records the statement made by Ellingson at the inquest. At that time Dorothy's father declared she was normal, as far as he was able to judge.

Ellingson broke down once during his time on the stand, when he told of the queer actions of his wife prior to Dorothy's birth. For several minutes he was able to answer questions only haltingly.

Dorothy herself has not suffered any of the hysteria or fainting spells which characterized her first trial.

The object of the governor's investigation will be to determine whether carelessness and lax discipline on the part of the prison administration were responsible for the break. The governor discredited charges made by Oswald West and others that utter inefficiency was shown by Warden Dalrymple. However, he will make an effort to ascertain the facts. At least that was his declared intention yesterday.

### Bonfield Trial Nearing Close This Afternoon

Bill Bonfield on the witness stand this afternoon denied all the charges of possession of liquor that were heaped on him by state witnesses this morning.

He denied that a pitcher on the sink of his house in Hot Springs Addition contained whiskey; he denied that there was any liquor in the house or on his property; and he denied ownership of a cache of liquor hidden in the weeds a short distance from his house but not on his property.

Testimony of state witnesses this morning that they had seen Bonfield pouring liquor into the sink when they were looking into the room Tuesday afternoon was declared by Bonfield to be a physical impossibility, because the sink can not be seen from outside the back door.

Bonfield declared that when he was at the sink Chief of Police Loucks and State Prohibition Agent McBride started to strike him over the head with a revolver and sap respectively.

"I told them that was not necessary and that I would not put up any fight," the witness testified.

L. L. McBride, state prohibition agent, the chief witness for the state and the leader of the raid on the Bonfield home, testified that he had caught Bonfield pouring the last of a pitcher of whiskey into a sink and that a small portion of the liquor had been saved for evidence.

### RAILROAD PLANS AUTOBUS ROUTE

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 14.—Two of the four trains now operating between Walla Walla and Peaslee on the Union Pacific railway on August 20, will be replaced by a large automobile bus, according to announcement made here today by W. J. Leonard, district freight and passenger agent.

This will be the first time that a railroad will have entered into direct competition with motor buses on the highways of this district.

Aleel, between Hot Lake and La Grande, and near Summerville, Imbler, Cove and Union received showers. Reports say one inch fell at Cove and about two inches near Aleel. The mountains above Union were drenched severely, putting out all forest fires.

Basements were flooded in La Grande in the downtown district, and hail stones the size of marbles fell during the storm.

The crop damage was reported to be confined to ripened unharvested grain and garden truck.
