

**Foothold Gained
By Sheep Men In
Move for Wells**

George Lyons Assures Directors of Support Before U. S. Senators

Directors of Klamath Wool Growers Association returned yesterday from Alturas after a conference with George W. Lyons, supervisor of the Modoc National forest, convinced that they are now a step nearer to their objective, namely the securing of a special appropriation to finance digging of wells in various locations of the national forest.

Mr. Lyons assured the directors that he would cooperate in urging the eight senators who will be in southern Oregon to investigate grazing problems on national forests soon, to sponsor the movement for wells on the Modoc forest.

That not only the livestock men of southern Klamath and northern California, but also the government

would benefit by such a move is the belief of the wool growers association. Many square miles of good grazing land in the forest can not be utilized by sheep or cattle men because of no available water. But with wells, more bands of sheep and more herds of cattle could graze on the fertile government range, and the cost of the wells would be more than paid in a few years by the additional money that would be paid for grazing fees.

The directors who conferred with Director Lyons were Dennis O'Connor, Michael P. Barry, James Lacey, Ned O'Connor and A. M. Thomas.

**Arctic Plane Is
Damaged in Storm**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. (AP)—With one of its planes temporarily out of commission, the MacMillan Arctic expedition is going ahead with the other two to establish an intermediate base at Flagler Fjord, on Ellesmere Island, about 100 miles from Etah, Greenland, the main base.

The airplane 'Na-2' was damaged at Etah during a storm yesterday. She was put aboard the steamer Bowdoin to be repaired. The planes Na-1 and Na-3 weathered the storm safely.

Flagler Fjord was decided upon for a sub-base between Etah and Cape Thomas Hubbard on Axel Heiberg Island, where the advance flying base will be located during a reconnaissance flight Tuesday night. It was planned to place supplies there last night.

TRANSMIT REPLY

PARIS, Aug. 14.—The reply to Germany's latest security pact communication is to be transmitted to Brussels, London, and Prague today and a copy will be shown to Count Szezyzsky, who is in Paris. It will be forwarded to Germany next week.

This was the decision reached at last night's cabinet meeting at which Foreign Minister Briand reported as result of his conversation with Austen Chamberlain in London, on the security pact.

WRITES ON LOAN

TURIN, Italy, Aug. 24. (AP)—The financial writer of the Gazzetta del Popolo says that an American loan to the Italian government of from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 at 5 1/2 per cent is being discussed in financial circles. With commissions and other expenses the cost of such a loan would rise to 7 per cent this writer says.

The Gazzetta del Popolo adds that something of this kind is necessary owing to the constant growth of Italian industries which require either a foreign loan or an increase in the currency, which would be dangerous for the national economy.

FRAYNE GETS DRAW

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 14. (AP)—Ted Frayne, Seattle light heavyweight and Morino Ramieri of Great Falls, drew in six rounds last night in the main event of a card presented at the Oakes water stadium, Lake Stellacom, near here. The ring was erected on a float in the middle of the stadium which enclosed a body of water 200 feet square.

Young Jack Dempsey, Tacoma light-heavyweight, knocked out Otis Anderson, Tacoma veteran, in the third round.

**Water Main Is
Repaired; Crew
Cuts Pavement**

Much cursing and other manifestations of annoyance were prevalent in Main street business offices and stores between Fourth and Fifth yesterday afternoon.

There was a reason. The water was turned off while a crew of the California Oregon Power company repaired a leaky water main in front of Baldwin Hardware store.

Thought to have been caused by vibration of the main, the general location of the leak was discovered about 4 p.m. But the crew, before they could lift a chunk of the pavement from the street, were forced to drill with a long spike through the pavement so the exact location of the leak could be ascertained.

The third try proved successful and a six feet by four feet square of pavement was removed to allow the Copco crew to get down to the leak and cork it up.

This is the second leak of the water main this week, the first having occurred on the corner of Sixth and Main before the American National bank.

**Girl to Attempt
To Swim Channel**

BOULOGNE, France, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Miss Lillian Harrison of Buenos Aires, who was compelled to abandon her fourth attempt to swim across the English channel on Monday, when about eight miles from the English coast, has made up her mind to have another trial this coming Monday, especially if Miss Gertrude Ederle, the New York girl, decides to start then.

Efforts are being made to induce Mile. Sion, French swimmer, who was forced to abandon her attempt to swim the channel early this month when a mile and a half from her goal, to start out on Monday night also. But the French woman does not command her resources as the others, and says she will not be ready to start until the end of the month, or early in September.

Miss Ederle's preparations are now very complete and those of the Argentine girl can be made at short notice if she definitely decides to start on Monday.
