PRISONER RICKS BECAUSE HIS HEAD WAS SAVED

BERLIN.—Otto Leest, murderer and robber, was highly indignant recently when German officials refused to "chop his head off," and instead commuted his death sentence to life imprisonment. He also hated the lawyer who saved his neck. He has no choice now, however, but to keep his head on for a commutation represents a sovereign act and may not be annulled. Leest had previously waived the right of appeal and insisted on being executed. In the meantime, and unknown to him, his counsel had petitioned for commutation, which was granted. The moment Leest heard of the change in sentence he became very much incensed and immediately wrote the following petition to the minister of justice: "I won't accept this pardon and insist on having my head chopped off under all circumstances. It is I who have the right to decide about myself and not my lawyer. He is altogether too officious."

MEAT EATING ENDORSED STANFORD UNIVERSITY, CALIF.

—Prof. James R. Slonaker of the physiology department at Stanford university has emerged from eight years of experimenting with the conviction that meat eaters, as compared with vegetarians, will live longer, have more children and be of more hardy physique. Prof. Slonaker confined his laboratory research to 40 pairs of white rats, but he said that the conclusions he reached coincided with reports of the results of restricted diet on people in many localities after the World war. He divided the rats into two equal groups, feeding one set an ordinary diet including a protein, the other the same diet minus the protein. He found that withdrawing meat from the rats' diet caused males to weigh 35 per cent less than those fed meat, the females 28 per cent less. The vegetable diet shortened the male's life 33 per cent, the female's 49 per cent, caused 29 per cent fewer rats to be born and also brought about loss of power of reproduction by the third generation. The proportion of males to females was reduced among the vegetarian rats.

FRENCH ORPHAN BOY JOINED AMERICAN ARMY AT AGE OF 10

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Capitol post No. 9 of the American Legion has an actual member. Maurice Packer, a French orphan who joined the American army in France in December, 1917, when he was 19 years old. The 162nd Infantry adopted Packer, and to avoid technicalities his name was placed formally on the muster roll. When the outfit was in action he was left with French families back of the lines. Wearing three service stripes, indicative of 18 months of service overseas, the boy was discharged at Camp Lewis, Wash., April 16, 1919. Thus he was entitled to full membership in the legion. An experienced bugler, he has joined the drum and bugle corps of the post. When adopted by the soldiers, Maurice spoke little English. In the six years he has been in this country he has passed through the grades of grammar school and completed the first three years of high school.
