C., who conducted a tour of inspection through the valley. Among those who accompanied the tour were County Agent C. A. Henderson, Lynn L. Sabin, secretary of the chamber of commerce, Roy Nelson, M. M. Mo'schenbacher, J. W. Kerns, Louis Jaco, Ed Geary, Everett Geary and George Stevenson.

Crops of beets, lettuce, canary grass, barley, and rye were inspected by Mr. Jackman and informal lectures were conducted on best methods of cultivation on peat land and reclaimed marsh land.
