Many New Forest Trails Are Built

(Special to The Herald) YREKA, Calif., Aug. 17.—More than 87 miles of new trails were built in the Klamath National Forest, which is in the confines of the county lines of Siskiyou, during the federal fiscal year ending June 30, according to the report issued this week by Fred D. Douthitt, supervisor in charge.

A tabulation of how the forest officials are opening hundreds of heretofore inaccessible and yet the finest hunting and fishing regions in the United States, shows that two and two-tenths miles of road was constructed and 93 miles maintained during the yearly period and that in addition to the 87 miles of new trail, 510.6 miles of trail were maintained.

Highway Repair Work Is Started

Contractors started laying rock today on the re-macadamizing of the highway between here and Algoma, and the work will be rushed as rapidly as possible.

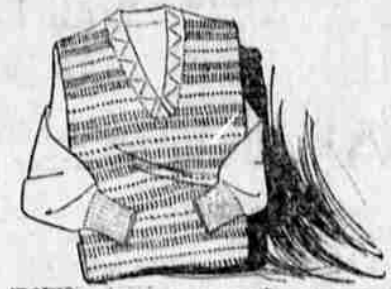
