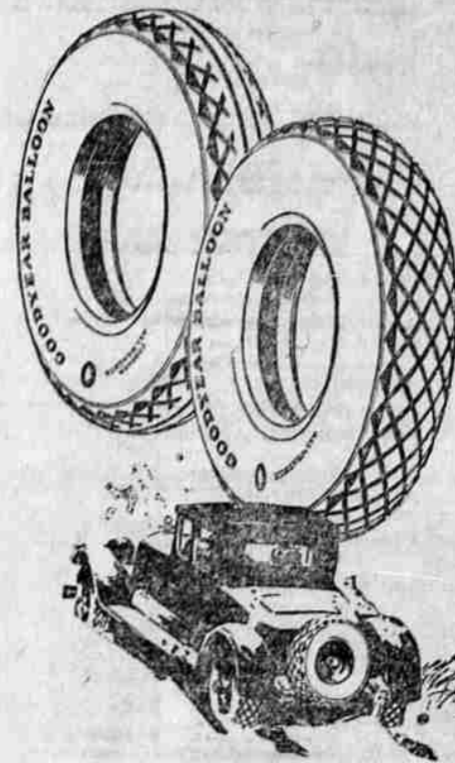

More False Rumors

The situation this morning was substantially the same as it has remained since Wednesday night. Reports and rumors came in at periodic intervals during Saturday night and Sunday, but investigation failed to substantiate the value of any one of them.

Officials view with concern a report from Portland police received last Saturday that Tom Kelly, cousin of Ellsworth Kelly, one of the escaped convicts, who had been employed as a taxi driver in Portland, had left his job Thursday morning for the announced purpose of visiting his mother in Turner whom he said was seriously ill. He asked his employer for and obtained \$25 back pay before leaving Thursday morning. Saturday morning he notified the taxi company to send his keys and the remainder of the pay due him to the Eden home apartments in The Dalles.

See Footprints

The most substantial information received Sunday was the report of Captain Paul Hendricks of the Oregon National Guard at 10:30 yesterday morning that footprints had been found where a man had crossed a small creek running through the Henry Jaquet place, a half mile east of the Victor Point school house. He declared that the tracks were fresh and that the person who made them had hob nails on the left shoe. A truck was rushed to the district from the prison and national guardsmen who had been scattered over a considerable area were brought together for a concentrated search on this lead.

At three o'clock Captain Hendricks reported the discovery, near the Jaquet place, of a pair of discarded cotton work socks found near a barn in the direction of Union Hill. One of the socks has been patched crudely and by hand with a piece of muslin. This evidence was rushed to the prison for identification and inspection by guards.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 17.—National guardsmen will be kept on duty as long as there is any hope that the three escapes are hiding out, it was announced yesterday by Governor Pierce, if any difficulty is found in keeping citizens volunteers in the posse after their enthusiasm has lagged. The announcement was made following a seven-hour tour which he made and which began shortly after ten o'clock in the morning, taking him through the entire district under guard.

"I believe that the men are still hiding somewhere in the region that is being watched, but I do not believe we will get them until they come out of hiding for food," the governor declared after his return to prison.
