The first definite step toward the completion of two county road projects was to have been taken up this afternoon by the county court with the authorization of advertising for bids on the construction of a new bridge across Lost river at Harpold's dam and the grading of 5.3 miles of the Midland market road from Miller Hill school house to Midland.

Final discussion of the two projects before advertisement, was held at the meeting of the county court on Saturday afternoon.

Both projects will be completed before winter. Approximate cost of the Midland market road project will be \$20,000. It is the plan of the court to allow the grading to settle during the winter in order to be in good condition for surfacing in the spring.

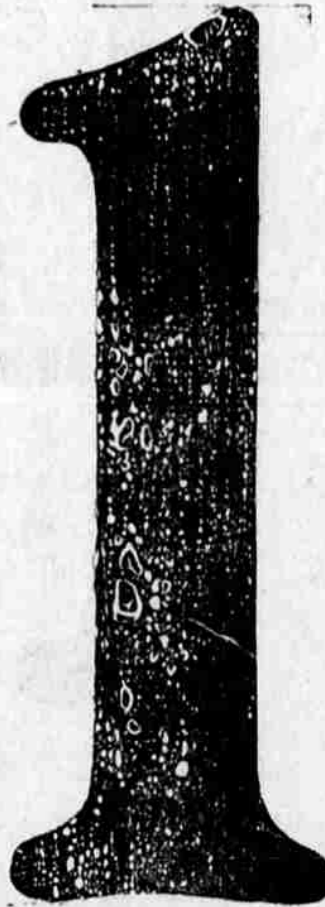

Oregon Leads at South Entrance To Crater Park

Up until two o'clock Sunday, Oregon held a lead over all states for tourists entering at the south entrance to Crater Lake, with 237 people from Oregon, outside of Klamath Falls, which had close to three hundred at the early hour in the day. California cars brought 92 people into the park; South Dakota 7; Washington 4; Missouri 4; Arizona 2; Kansas 2; Nevada 2 and Connecticut 2.

People from all parts of the country continue to visit the scenic spot, 150 cars were registered in at the south entrance at shortly after noon yesterday, according to Lester Turnbaugh, who is in charge of registration at the southern entrance.

While work is underway on the road through the park, and a number of detours must be made, the road is in good condition and the trip can be made in good time.
