

### May Abandon Polar Flight Attempt May Be Halted Until Next Year, Report

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—(AP)—A possibility developed today that the MacMillan Arctic expedition might abandon for this year its effort to fly over the unknown region of the polar sea.

It was indicated that the conference went into the question whether it would be better to give up the attempt to fly over the unknown region this year and concentrate upon exploring regions of Greenland and Labrador in quest of scientific information. The weather for some time has been giving the expedition increasing apprehension. Messages have told of unusual conditions with storms, ice filled bays and fjords and the mountains covered with ice and snow.

terhouse did not kick Jones. Jones seemed to lose his head for a minute, and instead of letting the turnkey go ahead and open the case, knocked him down with a blow of his fist.

**Jones Still Unarmed**  
"Jones was unarmed as yet, and the gun case was locked. Jones ran over to a desk in the corner of the turnkey's office and looked for a six shooter in the drawer.

**Jones Runs Wild**  
"When he emptied the first gun he picked up another one and did the same thing, but did not register a hit. Jones was running wild. He expected to be killed, and was apparently making his last stand. He was shooting wild.

Those children in the district served by Central school, whose birthdays come between November 1 and January 1, may enter the mid-year first grade class.

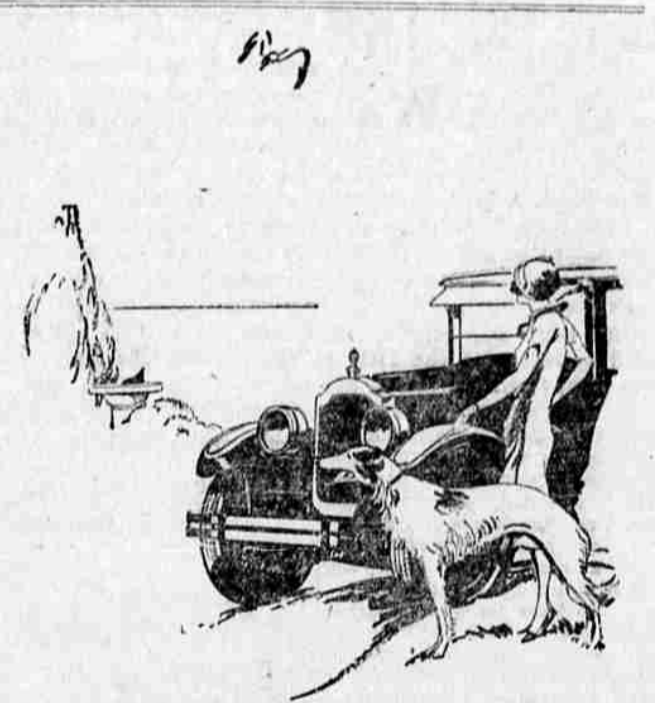
No other mid-year first grade class will be established in the four other city schools.
