They stopped at the home of Attorney General Sargent, who is in Washington, and spent an hour visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Pierson, son in law and daughter of the attorney general.

The President and Mrs. Coolidge took back to Plymouth a basketful of fresh vegetables which they helped the Piersons gather in their garden.

POWER FINANCES GIVEN HEARING

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 18. (AP)—Financial conditions of the Pacific Power and Light company, as interpreted by Henry F. Moore, certified public accountant, were aired today no resumption of the department of public works hearing of the rate case brought against the company by the municipalities of the Walla Walla-Yakima district. Mr. Moore summed up his testimony with an attack on the financial position of the respondent company.

Complaints were virtually all of Mr. Moore's testimony were based upon the grounds that it is a matter of law that stocks and bonds of a utility are not related to the rate base and that they are not to be computed in reaching a fair rate of return nor the amount of depreciation to be set up on the books of the company; That his finds are based upon assumptions.
