TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 19. (AP)—Tacoma police officers early Wednesday were notified that three men believed to be the trio who escaped from the Oregon prison last Wednesday night had fired on a truck 19 miles north of Centralia at midnight.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 19.—The three escaped slayers from the Oregon state penitentiary, Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelly and James Willos, are headed for the vicinity and plan to visit the parents of Murray, who live on Bainbridge Island in Puget Sound, west of Seattle, was the belief expressed by police here tonight.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 19.—An automobile believed to have been stolen in Roseburg, containing three men, passed through here today, it was reported to the police. One of the men was identified as Ellsworth Kelly, one of the escaped convicts, by an employe of a local power company. Officers are following the machine.

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 19.—Three men, claimed to closely resemble Murray, Willos and Kelly, accompanied by a woman, were seen in Umatilla last night, according to reports reaching here. A store was reported robbed during the night at Irigon, near Umatilla. The sheriff's office is working on the case and fingerprints found will be examined.
