Shadley Will Not Be Tried In U. S. Court

Charges Against Chiloquin Officer to be Dropped

If an Indian socks an Indian in the law, then the federal authorities can prefer charges against the socker.

But if a white man socks an Indian, the white man will not be prosecuted under federal statute because there is no law which would support prosecution.

This was the decision yesterday afternoon of Bert C. Thomas, United States Commissioner, when Mrs. Frank Hoover desired to swear to a complaint against Henry Shadley, deputy sheriff, constable and reservation officer, on the charge of assault and battery.

Thus the shadow who was cast over Shadley, as a peace officer, has been withdrawn, or virtually so. The state has practically wiped its hands of the affair and Thomas will not handle the matter in his court.

Mrs. Hoover, a young Indian matron of Chiloquin, complained that Shadley had assaulted her when she was near the Chiloquin jail, and had dragged her away from the jail by her feet.

First Cattle Fair Entries Are Announced

West and Watters Will Exhibit High Grade Shorthorn Breeders

The first entries in the beef cattle division were turned in to the office of the fair board today by the Shorthorn breeders, West and

Watters, of the Edgedale herd. Recently a splendid young shorthorn bull, Collynie Violet's Pride, was imported from the famous Blackhawk ranch in Contra Costa county, California, and will be among the animals entered for the county fair.

Villager Lady, the herd sire, is winner of many a blue, inheriting the splendid qualities of his famous sire, Prince Villager. Two young bulls, Edgedale Ardmore and Edgedale Gainford, will compete with their kind in the senior and junior bull calf classes, respectively. Matchless Missus is entered for the aged cow class and has to date shown the

individuality of her dam, Gainford Matchless, in the snow ring. Two cows in the three year old class, one heifer calved in 1923, two calved in 1924 and two junior heifer calves complete their list of individual entries.

West and Watters have also entered for graded herd which comprises one aged bull and four females of various ages; yearling herd of one bull and two heifers; pair of calves and get of sire which necessitates the showing of four animals any age, both sex to be represented.

Showing that they are true "chips off the block" young Don West and Tom Watters, Jr., have entered their purebred baby beef calves, Edgedale Villager and Red Villager, for the senior and junior calf classes and the First National bank's special \$25 prize for baby beef.

All in all, the West & Watters exhibit will be well worth seeing and it is anticipated and predicted by the men that know, the herd if taken across the Cascades and to the state fair, will give some of the more advertised Shorthorn herds some extremely sad moments when the awards are handed out.
