CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Victor Fremont Lawson, one of the greatest and one of the last of America's pioneer journalists, is dead. The editor and publisher of the Chicago Daily News died last night at his home here after an illness of only three days of heart ailment from which he suffered frequently in recent years.
