GAMBLING CRAZE HITS CORK HARD, CIVIC OFFICIAL AVERS

CORK, Ireland, Aug. 19. (AP)—At a hearing at which the defendants were bookmakers, accused of violating the law by accepting bets on horse races, the superintendent of the civic guard of Cork asserted that "the city has simply gone mad on the betting craze—men, women and children—and something ought to be done about it." Every part of the city was affected, more or less, he averred and the craze had even penetrated into the pupils of the public schools.

Whenever a big race was scheduled traffic in the principal streets was often held up by the people who assembled to discuss the event and to make bets on their favorite animals.

The crowds jammed the thoroughfares said the superintendent, and stood about for hours with newspapers and racing papers in the hands, discussing "form," and to make matters worse, "most of the people to whom I have referred could not afford to bet. When they do so they neglect their cares at home."

The three principal defendants were fined \$100 each.

FORMER IRISH LEADER DIES

BELFAST—(AP)—Edward M. Clayton, a former assistant inspector general of the Irish constabulary who died at St. Jean Despuy, France, was, with several English ministers, included in a list of persons whom a Cork jury held shared the responsibility for the slaying of Lord Mayor MacCurtain.

District Inspector Swanzy, who also was mentioned in the list afterward was slain in Lisburn, near Belfast, when hundreds of Catholic homes were burned as a reprisal.
