Riverside city park be sold to the Oregon Trunk railroad and the Southern Pacific company.

The sale price is \$7500 an acre for the eight acres. The Southern Pacific has contracted to purchase approximately six acres for about \$45,000 and the Oregon Trunk about two acres for \$15,000.

Although the sale price of the park is \$62,000, the city will receive but approximately \$59,000. This is due to the fact that the city must pay Richard Hammond \$2500 and Rufus Moore \$10,000 to release to the city the claim they had on the property in event it was not used for a city park.

Comes Down \$1000

Hammond at first demanded \$3500 for the release to the city of his claim on the property. But a committee from the board, headed by Roy Durbin, called on Mr. Hammond and prevailed him to come down \$1000 in his price.

Rufus Moore demanded and will receive \$10,000 for the release on the property he sold to the city park five years ago. But Mr. Moore has officially announced that he will bequeath to the city 80 acres of land just outside the northwest boundary of the city along the Rock creek highway, providing the sale of the south Riverside park is successfully consummated.

Question arose at the meeting of whether or not the property should be sold at auction or whether it should be deeded to the city. Although J. H. Carmalan was of the opinion that the property could be transferred successfully to the railroad companies without resorting to auction, R. C. Groesbeck, attorney for the Southern Pacific stated that his company favored that the land be sold at auction.

Wants to be Regular

"We are anxious to follow the formalities in order that our title to the property be not disputed in the future," Mr. Groesbeck pointed out. "As I understood Mr. Hart of the Northern lines, he is of the same opinion."

Following is the motion put by Baldwin which is the official recommendation of the park sale to the city council:

Following is a formal report of the proceedings:

"Motion by Will W. Baldwin seconded by Roy Durbin that the Board of City Park commissioners recommend to the City Council of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the sale of the west portion of Riverside Park to the Oregon Trunk railway, as shown by their drawings, said property to be approximately two hundred feet on the south boundary and approximately one hundred and fifty feet deep on the north boundary on West Main street for the

sum of \$15,000.00 plus \$7,500 per acre for the small portion added to Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4, and the sale to the Central Pacific company of the east portion of Riverside Park subject to such reversion clauses as are held by the Oregon Trunk railway, the acreage to be computed by a re-survey in accordance with the original deeds from grantors to the City of Klamath Falls for the sum of \$7500.00 per acre.

"Basements be retained for any necessary electric conduits, water mains, sewer lines, and location for a septic tank or sewage disposal plant to be determined at the proper time by the City Engineer located near the south boundary with attachments there to."

"The park board reserving the privilege of using the tennis court until construction work is started by the railway companies. Also reserve for removal, the fence around the tennis court and all shade trees on the park property. Said sale to be made within fifty days and title given by bargain and sale deed."
