#### INCREASED SALES SHOW POPULARITY OF TRACTORS

CHICAGO—(P)—Tractors lead farm equipment sales throughout the first half of 1925, as shown by the Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers, which surveyed its officials who are heads of most of the 200-odd firms making up its membership and selling through some 21,000 dealers to the farmers. Plow and tillage tool makers report the first half of the year ahead of 1924, and the tendency towards bigger equipment to eliminate man and horse labor is more marked than at any time in the history of the tractor's development. Oliver Chilled Plow Works reports 20 per cent increase. One great company estimates its two-row cultivator business 50 per cent ahead of last year.

The American Seeding Machine Company reports 33 1-3 per cent increase over 1924 in grain drill business.

The first half of 1925 has seen a 24 per cent increase over the same period last year with Fairbanks, Morse & Company on farm scales, gas engines, windmills, water supply systems and feed grinders, the reports show.

#### Malin Postmaster Dead; Funeral Is Held Today, 1:30

Following an illness or less than two days, J. A. McComb, postmaster of Malin, died yesterday at noon at his home in the Tule Lake valley town. Falling health for more than a year led up to the rapid decline which resulted in his death. Funeral services are being held today at 1:30 p. m. in Malin, with burial in the Mt. Laki cemetery following.

Mr. McComb was born in Fern Valley, Iowa, November 29, 1871, being 53 years old at the time of his death. He had been a resident of Klamath county for 14 years, hav-

ing farmed in the Mt. Laki and Malin sections during that time, taking up the post office work about a year ago.

Three children survive, besides the widow, a daughter and a son, Floyd, both in Montana, and a son David S.,

at home in Malin. Two brothers and a sister, also outlive the deceased, D. A. McComb, Merrill route; R. R. McComb, Turtle Lake, South Dak.; Mrs. Charles N. Snow, Crescent avenue, Klamath Falls. A large host of friends also mourn his departure.



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
