### PROBE OF STATE PRISON STARTED BY COMMISSION

Complete Investigation of Recent Break Will be Instituted

INTERVIEW CONVICTS Work Will be All-Embracing With no Limitations of Any Kind

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 24.—The full and complete investigation of conditions at the Oregon state prison promised by Governor Pierce with the appointment of Colonel C. G. Thomson, Superintendent of Crater Lake National Park; Brigadier Gen. A. White, adjutant of the Oregon National Guard, and Jefferson Myers, former state treasurer by appointment of the governor, started here this morning. The inquiry was occasioned by the recent prison break.

Stating that no limitations had been placed upon them by the governor, members of the investigating committee, this morning said that their probe would be all-embracing in its scope, and would extend into contributing causes of the break as well as general conditions. They intimated that recommendations for alterations and improvements at the prison will be contained in their report.

The committee spent the entire day at the prison inspecting the plant and interviewing employes and prisoners. They said they had no idea of how long it would take them to complete their work.

Warden Dalrymple has announced that work will begin in the near future on the construction of a guard tower over the front gate, in which will be housed the prison arsenal. The tower will command a full view of the front of the prison and a guard stationed in that position would have been able to head off both of the sensational escapes in which Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelly and Bert (Oregon) Jones figured in the last year and a half.

The warden has also announced that the steps leading to guard towers number 1 and number 7 from

Another high official of the Northern lines was a visitor in Klamath Falls today when Howard Elliott of New York City, chairman of the board of directors of the Northern Pacific, arrived in the city from Crater Lake.

Mr. Elliott, who was accompanied by Chief Engineer Winshell, of the S. P. & S., and his assistant G. V. Lintner, spent several hours in Klamath Falls inspecting certain properties in the city which the Northern lines are interested in and then left for Lakeview.

Mr. Elliott and his party plan to remain in Lakeview tonight and then leave tomorrow morning for Bend. The trip of the rail official is primarily one of inspection, similar to that made several months ago by Louis W. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern railroad.
