Buick Remains in Lead in All Sales

Buick remains in the lead in the sale of six-cylinder cars in California, according to figures contained in the Motor Registration News of August 15, 1925. These show that during the first seven months of 1925, 6027 Buicks were registered in California. The second highest-selling six registered 5805 cars, the third 5632, and the fourth 5553.

Buick sales for the first seven months of the current year show a gain over those of last year, 6027 Buicks being registered this year, against 5861 for the same period of 1924.

In Northern California, Buick again led all six-cylinder makes in sales for the month of July, with

a total of 395 registrations as compared with 366 for the second six-cylinder car on the list, 355 for the third and 302 for the fourth.

Buick also led all other makes in July registrations for San Francisco.

With the arrival of the new 1926 Better Buick models, with their many important mechanical improvements, and with the announcement of the new and materially reduced schedule of Buick prices, even greater sales records are anticipated for the coming months by H. E. Hauger, Buick dealer here.

He was told to file a written claim with the warden for the \$50 and was informed that the \$1,000 could not be paid until the legislature had passed upon the governor's recommendation that such an appropriation be made.

Met With Counterclaims

Carson returned to the prison in the afternoon to file his claim, but was met with the counter claims of Centralia police officers, who declared that Carson had only informed on Murray when he himself was threatened with arrest as a suspicious character.

Warden Dalrymple told Carson and the Centralia officers to settle the matter of division of the \$50 reward between themselves but up to this noon no claim for any of the reward money had been filed either with the warden or at the governor's office.

Warden Dalrymple accounts for Carson's trip to California through a statement that Carson made to officers at the prison Saturday afternoon, in which he said that he had been "tipped off" that it would not "be safe for him to be seen around Portland."

Editor Leaves Big Fortune to Charity

CHICAGO, Aug. 25. (AP)—Virtually three fourths of the estate of the late Victor F. Lawson, noted editor and owner of the Chicago Daily News, was left to benevolent purposes. The newspaper and other property was left to the management of the Illinois Merchants Trust company as trustee. Specific bequests totalled \$4,775,000, of which more than one half, or \$2,505,000 were for benevolences.

A specific bequest of \$200,000 was left to his long time friend and co-worker in journalism, Melvin E. Stone, of New York City, now counsel- lor and formerly general manager of the Associated Press.

Clever Advance Men Secure Money from Singers and Leave for South

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 25. (AP)—Fifty boys, members of the Los Angeles boy's chorus, are stranded here. Three weeks ago the chorus, made up of boys ranging from 8 to 22 years old, set out from Los Angeles on a cross country concert tour. Defalcations of advance agents for the tour are said to be responsible for the financial plight of the chorus.

Two weeks ago, in Albuquerque, N. M., an advance agent fled with \$150 proceeds from concerts. Two new agents were hired. They disappeared from Kansas City, together with funds advanced them for expenses.

A two night concert had been scheduled for Kansas City but when the chorus arrived it was learned the advance agent had departed without making arrangements for the concert.

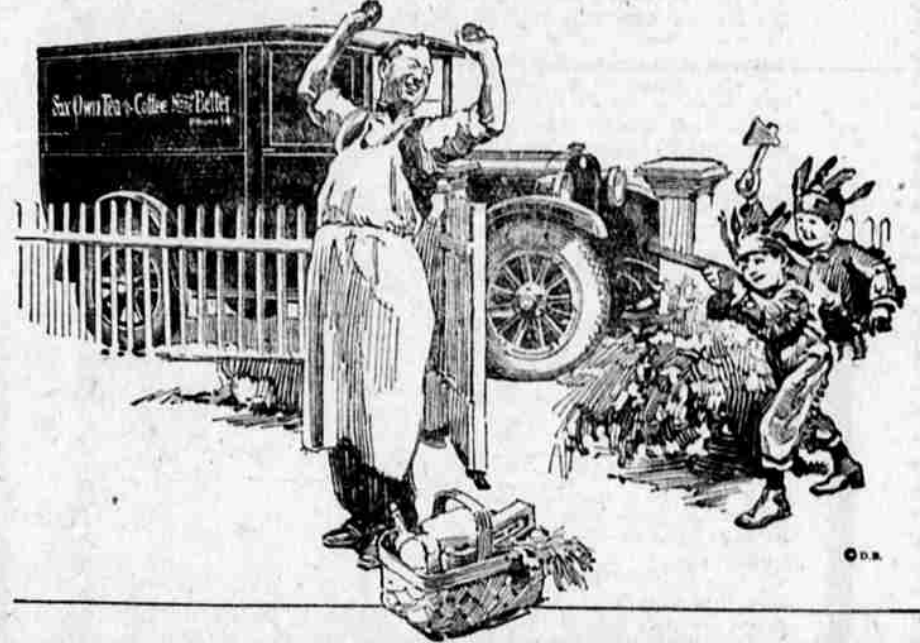
