

### Fair Leaders Will Arrange For Exhibits

### Livestock Superintendents Will Meet Next Thursday

A special meeting of superintendents of the various livestock divisions is called for next Thursday at 1 p. m. in Room D, Courthouse, at which time the final arrangements will be made for completing all preparations for receiving the large livestock exhibits at the county fair. This year's entries promise to be heavier than heretofore and the stock of higher quality and to many outstanding animals imported into the county during the past two years, whose get is just beginning to show the prepotency of the splendid sires and dams.

Most of the livestock entries from club boys and girls were received Monday by the fair board and form a large and attractive string which always has an admiring crowd at the county fair, watching the youngsters taking care of and training their stock for the coming judging.

#### Club Members Compete

The majority of the boys and girls in dairy calf work have Tillamook calves and stand a chance for the American National Bank's special \$25 prize. Some of them, however, have calves in club work of their own or their father's breeding and will of course have to content themselves with plenty of competition in the open classes. Melvin E. Bowman of Merrill a Guernsey heifer, Tillie; Vernon Durant of Merrill Route, a heifer calf and his brother, Eugene, another, all Tillamooks from the 1925 importation; Frank McCornack, Jr., of Upper Lake, enters a purebred Shorthorn calf, Blossom, in open competition for baby beef and also for Shorthorns; Bryant Williams, R. F. D. No. 1, Klamath Falls, enters purebred Ozle Moonlight Maid in the Holstein senior heifer class; Anna Burnett of Midland enters two Holstein heifers, Peggy and Tulle; Thelma and Phelps Lewis of the Merrill Route each a year-old Holstein heifer; Cecil Haley of the Merrill route his Holstein heifer, Dixie Queen; Wilbur Short of the Lakeview route is entering his Holstein heifer calf; Dalpha Spence, of Midland, her Jersey grade calf; Earl Jackson of R. F. D. No. 1 his purebred Holstein junior bull calf; Bill Bailey, of Merrill, his Jersey grade heifer under one year of age and Frank Briscoe, of Fort Klamath, his purebred Poland China sow under 6 months of age.

#### Close in a Week

Only one week more remains before livestock entries will close. This is necessary owing to the fact that the state law on T. B. testing for all exhibition animals will be enforced and entries must be checked against the inspector's list of herds tested.

A prize winning shorthorn bull named Faithful was knocked down for \$60,000 to Bartolome Ginochis. It is asserted that the previous high mark paid for a bull was 10,500 pounds sterling in England, whereas Faithful fetched the equivalent of 12,000 pounds sterling.

With the fire out and no damage other than a slightly burned top, the owner of the car departed in haste, pausing only long enough to murmur, somewhat resentfully, that the liquid from the fire extinguishers had marred the upholstery in his back seat.

Ferguson, brothers of the missing nurse, today turned over to Contra Costa county officials strands of hair retrieved from a bathrobe belonging to Mrs. Loren, who lived with her mother and brothers in Oakland. These will be examined by Dr. E. O. Heinrich, Berkeley criminologist who will endeavor to establish whether they tally with strands of blond hair on the portions of scalp found in the swamp.

#### Identify Hair

Two Oakland women, close friends of Mrs. Loren, examined the sections of scalp and said they were positive the hair and scalp were those of Mrs. Loren.

Dr. Louis P. Corwin, Oakland dentist who said he had done considerable dental work for Mrs. Loren, examined the teeth in the lower jaw found late yesterday and said the dental work resembled that of Mrs. Loren's. He said he could not be certain in his identification as all the work performed by him had been on the upper jaw teeth.

#### Find Upper Jaw

"Find the upper jaw and I'll tell you whether it is that of Mrs. Loren," Dr. Corwin told investigators.

Work of pumping out the swamp along the El Cerrito river will get under way today under direction of Contra Costa county authorities. A powerful gasoline pump will be installed and the marsh drained sufficiently to facilitate the work of searchers for other portions of the dismembered body. The search will continue while the pumping is in progress. The water ranges in depth from a few inches to several feet. The marsh is several miles in extent. Under Sheriff W. M. Vale, said bulkheads or dykes might be erected to expedite the draining.

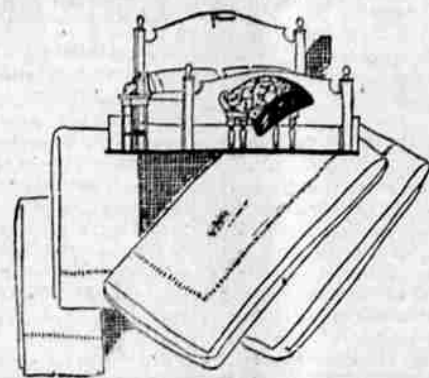
#### Wore Expensive Ring

### Huge Fire Strikes Block in Montreal

MONTREAL, Que. Aug. 25. (AP)—An entire block of buildings in Montreal was laid waste last night and early this morning by one of the most spectacular fires the city ever experienced.

The blaze, under a half gale spread rapidly and soon enveloped the entire block. The building consumed consisted of 20 or more dwellings, a large apartment house, an ice plant and other houses.

No estimate has been made of the damage. The casualties were comparatively small.

Most of these reported consisted of several firemen being overcome by smoke or cut by flying glass. One woman who suffered a broken arm when a piece of fire apparatus in turning a corner dashed through the plate glass of a cigar store.
