Carnival of Gloves is Promised by Promoter on September 5

Practically every fighter on the three lead bouts of the opening fall boxing card to be staged at the Scandinavian hall on the evening of Saturday, September 5th, has featured as the main event attraction in cards up and down the coast.

A supreme effort is being made by Matchmaker Brown, to start the fall and winter season of boxing off on the right foot and to this end the promoter has spared no effort to secure the best boxing talent available.

Ritchie Fights Olson

The headliners are well known, a lot of people have been wondering whether or not Earl Ritchie could check the onslaught of the fighting Swede, Sammy Olson. A chance for this question to be answered will be furnished the fight fans September 5, as there two heavyweights who weigh about 185 pounds apiece, will clash in the main event attraction.

Ritchie has fought his way back into the good graces of the fans and there are many who are confident that the Klamath behemoth will slip over a sleep punch on Olson. But Olson is faster and hits straight and quick.

Starkey Again

Seldom has any fighter fought himself into popularity as successfully as Kid Starkey, Chic middleweight, who on previous occasions defeated Johann Carison and Joe Coffman. Starkey will again be seen in action as the semi-main event when he tangles gloves with Duke Evans, of San Francisco, who comes to Klamath bearing a reputation of being a fast and slashing fighter. Evans fought Lefty Cooper, who fought Mickey Walker recently. Although Cooper outpointed "The Duke," it was a fast fight from the start. Both boys will weigh in at ringside around 140 pounds.

Sams vs. Morse

Just before he came here, Chuck Sams, cingling middleweight, fought the main event of a boxing card in Kelso, when he fought to a draw with George Ingersoll. The Kelso pride will meet Stanley Morse, of Bakersfield, Calif., who is a good level headed fighter who has the chiroform punch at the right time. There will be 30 rounds of boxing. Two preliminary bouts have yet to be arranged.

The boys are now getting in trim for the mill and fans are gathering around the training quarters watching them work out.

Each day at 3 o'clock, Olson, Evans and Morse work out in the Scandinavian hall. During the evening Starkey, Ritchie and Sams have their training periods.

The public is invited to attend the workouts in order to get a line-up on the card.

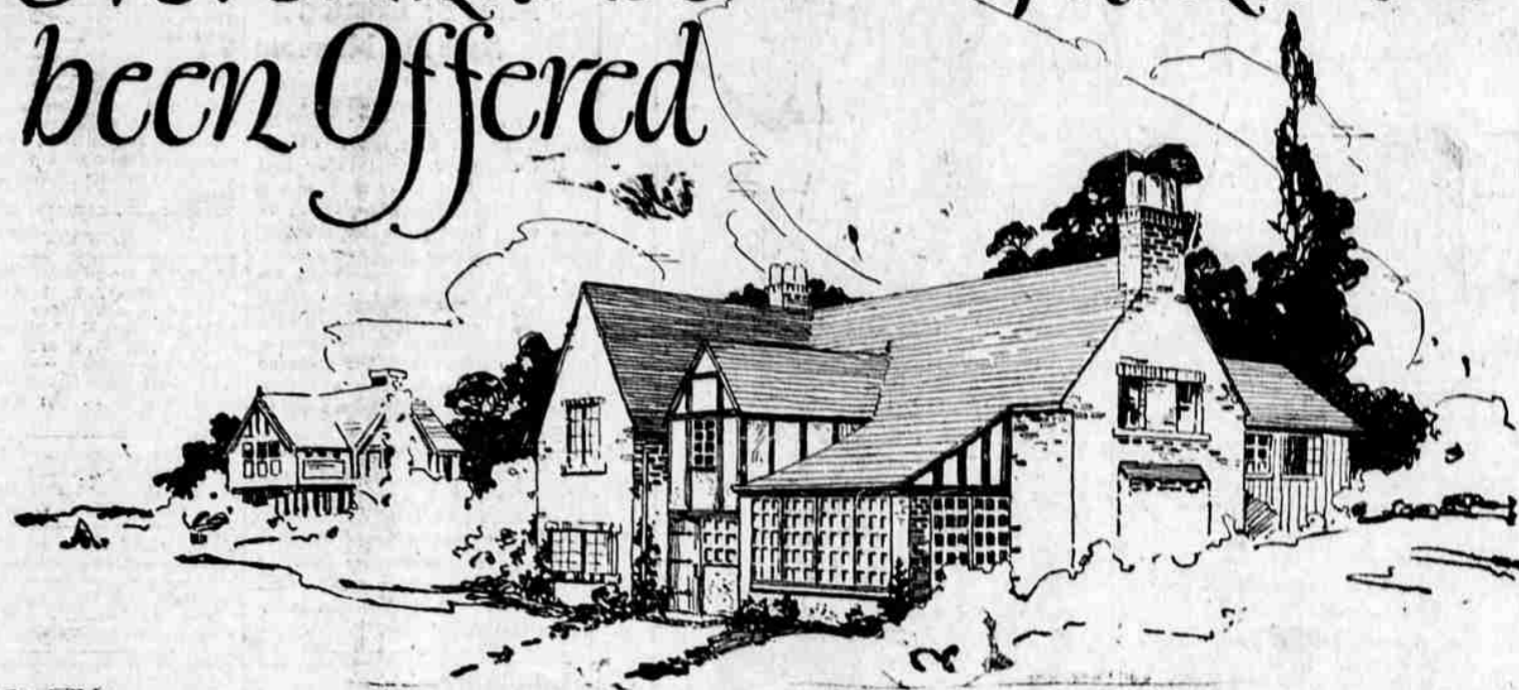
MRS. PADDOCK IMPROVES
