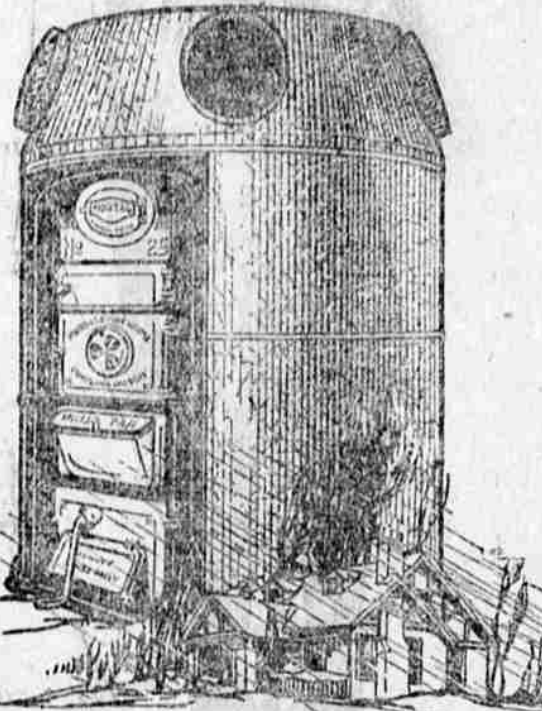

SCHOOL TO OPEN SEPTEMBER 8TH

Grades Will Start Week from Next Tuesday, says Superintendent

The elementary schools in Klamath Falls will open for the Fall term, Tuesday, September 8, Monday being Labor Day. There will be no afternoon session on the opening day. Pupils should report promptly at 9:00 a. m., for registration and assignment of lessons.

Lists of books and supplies for the various grades may be secured from either of the book dealers, or at the office of the superintendent of schools, Central School building. Pupils who have been regularly promoted to any grade, may purchase books at any time, preferably before the opening day. New pupils, pupils who withdrew from school before the close of last term, and all others who have not been regularly promoted, should make no purchases until they have consulted their teacher.

Pupils who will have reached the age of six years by November 1, 1925, may enter with the beginning class. Those who will reach their sixth birthday between November 1, and May 1, 1926, may enter with the beginning class after the sixth week of school, unless they have had sufficient instruction to enable them to go along with the class.

In first and second grades classes will be divided by semesters. In these grades all pupils who are ready for the second semester's work should report at Central School, regardless of the section of the city in which they live, since there will be no second semester classes in any of the other schools. Pupils for the second semester of the first grade should report at 1:00 p. m., instead of 9:00 a. m.

Boundary lines between the several schools remain unchanged from last year, with the following exception: the boundary line between Fairview and Pelican City school schools shall follow Lytton street west to E street, thence west on E street to Oregon Avenue, thence south on Oregon Avenue to Nevada Avenue. For further information relative to boundaries, call on the school superintendent or any of the principals.

Oakland Discovers Dangers from Dirt and Gets Remedy

All motorists dislike to "eat dirt." So do all motor cars. The only difference is that the motorist can hold his breath until the dust cloud has passed while the motor must keep on breathing whatever variety of air comes to the "nostrils" of its carburetor. The experiments were conducted

with the most delicate of scientific instruments some of which will measure a minute dust particle .005 of an inch in diameter.

The conclusion reached by these engineers has resulted in the adoption of the air cleaner with which the Oakland cars are equipped. This cleaner, which operates on the principle of the centrifugal cream separator, whirls every particle of dust and foreign matter from the air and feeds only the purified air into

the carburetor. Oakland and General Motors engineers have overwhelming proof of the necessity for such protection, regarding it as particularly important in the present day of heavy traffic and dust-stirring balloon tires.

Among other things it was found that an average automobile breathes 10,000 gallons of air with every gallon of gasoline. Every bit of this air contains dust to a great or lesser degree.

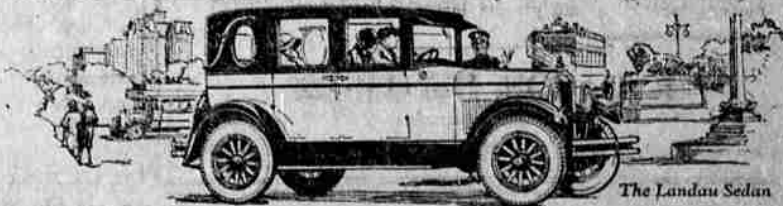
