

# MARSH GIVES UP MORE EVIDENCE OF VILE MURDER

## Teeth Taken to Dentist Who Served Mrs. Loren

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 27. (AP)—The entire upper part of the mouth of the supposed El Cerrito marsh murder victim was found today in the swampy ground by T. W. Blingley of the Richmond police department.

The teeth are intact. The find was rushed to an Oakland dentist who attended Mrs. Bessie Loren, a nurse, believed to be the victim. The new discovery is expected to establish definitely whether it was she whose body was dismembered.

The arrangement of the teeth and dental work correspond in a general way to description of Mrs. Loren's mouth given the police by her family. The head had been cut just under the nose, apparently by an expert. The rib of the mouth and the palate were left intact. As described by the police, this portion of the head revealed such skill in surgery that it looked like a dentist's exhibit.

There is a gold crown on a front upper tooth. Several fillings and other peculiarities are expected to make identification easy for a dentist.

Earlier in the day two blood stained sheets were found some distance from the marshes.

Previously portions of the woman's head had been discovered, but nothing as definite as the upper mouth had been revealed until today.

## Board Abolishes Fraternities at Salem Hi School

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 27.—Seven social organizations in Salem high school, said by the board to be secret societies, were abolished by action of the Salem school board here last night. All students entering high school next year will be required to sign written statements declaring that they do not belong to any of the organizations. The statements must also be signed by parents or guardians.

The rulings will be enforced by suspension or expulsion for non-compliance. It was stated by school officials this morning.

## Heavy Damage Done By Storm

### Calipatria, Cal., Suffers \$150,000 Loss

BRAWLEY, Calif., Aug. 27. (AP)—A survey of property damage and injuries resulting from last night's storm which struck California, 10 miles north of here, early today shows 14 of the town's larger business buildings and residence either demolished or badly damaged, and one woman fatally injured, while a half score of the other inhabitants sustained minor injuries. Business men estimate the damage at between \$1100,000 and \$150,000.

DAYTON, Ohio, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Fred G. Nickel, prominent manufacturer and confessed phantom bandit who held up the North Dayton Branch of the Dayton Savings and Trust company two weeks ago and obtained \$21,000 today declared his friends were partially responsible for his downfall.

"Friends, there are no such things as friends," he said. "If I had any friends to help me out of my financial dilemma, I would not be in trouble today."

## New Bleachers to Be Finished Soon

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, August 27.—(Special)—Construction of additional covered seating space is under way on Hayward field. The A. Pajunen construction company of Portland is in charge of the work, which will cost between \$20,000 and \$30,000. The building project will be completed before the first football game of the season, with Multnomah club of Portland, on October 3, according to the plans of J. W. Benefiel, graduate manager of the Associated Students.

With the completion of the new covered bleachers, seating capacity under cover for 13,500 will be provided, with room for approximately 5,000 on the remaining uncovered bleachers. Steel and wood are to be used in the new construction to which additional seats may be added later.

## LaFollett Through in State Politics

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 27.—Alex M. LaFollett, state senator from Marion county, made the definite statement today that he will not be a candidate for reelection next year.

### ARGENTINA PUTS EMBARGO ON WAR SUPPLIES IMPORTS

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 26.—President Alvear has signed a decree prohibiting the private importation of armaments and munitions of war into Argentina without special permission from the War Department, in which case they are only allowed to enter through the port of Buenos Aires.

The decree defines these prohibited imports as those which the nation imports for its own defense and also those used by other countries for similar purposes.
