Dr. F. M. Trout, president of the Malin Community club and veteran poultryman of that district, made entry of 39 birds in the poultry division for the coming county fair. No finer flock of Black Minorcas can be found than the sleek, glittering black fowl which Dr. Trout proudly exhibits at his pens in Malin. His heaviest entries embrace this breed with a pen of old birds, one of young stock, two hens, two cockerels and two pullets. A pen of young Indian Game poultry, a cock and hen, are also entered and will evoke much interest in this flashy and exceptional breed.

At the beginning of the poultry club work for boys and girls Dr. Trout, in the interests of raising better poultry throughout the county, donated a setting of eggs to every member of clubs whom County Club Leader Sexton deemed reliable to take charge and proper care of such a generous offer. Dr. Trout trapsnest all his hens and their egg records compare very favorably with many of the high producing flocks in the state.

It will be interesting to watch the results the club youngsters have obtained with this experimental poultry venture and if the offspring compete with their parents, how they come out when the ribbons are handed out.
