MANY HERE WILL VIOLATE LIGHT LAW IS BELIEF

Only One Testing Station Here Licensed to Make Changes

TWO MORE EQUIPPING

Many Indignant at New Regulation, in Effect First of Week

Lawbreakers in flocks will be cluttering up the highways of Klamath county next Tuesday, the direct result of the new auto lighting laws passed by the state legislature.

This was admitted to be more than a probability today by local garagemen, who say that to date but 25 Klamath county motorists have had their lights adjusted.

But One Station There is now only one place licensed to do the necessary adjusting, the Electric Equipment company, Eighth and Klamath. A station has been equipped by the Acme Motor company and also by the Balsiger Motor company, but to date their licenses have not been received from the state.

The Balsiger Motor company will test only lights on Ford cars or cars with Ford equipment. The Acme Motor company will test all cars.

The law, which is intended to nullify the present one regarding dimming, provides for globes of just 21 candle power in both headlights and spotlights, provides for the abolition of all spotlights except those that are bolted or otherwise fixed immovably on the car and provides for changes in lenses and reflectors in certain cars.

May Go to Courts It is this latter provision in the law which is being attacked throughout the state and on which it is understood test cases are to be made.

Those opposing it state that it is unconstitutional because it favors the makers of certain types of lenses and reflectors.

Local garagemen stated today that a majority of motorists here are outspoken in denouncing the action of the legislature in taking this step which will mean an added expense of from \$5 to \$10 for nearly every car owner in the state.

When she came to Klamath Falls she brought the youth with her, telling the parents they had been married in Portland. A few days ago the mother discovered that no marriage ceremony had been performed.

Meantime the couple have lived with the mother and step-father. The alleged husband is said to have a pronounced dislike for work of any kind.

Local authorities are undecided what course to pursue to straighten out the tangle and are understood to have recommended a marriage license as the best way out of the difficulty.

Speed Costs Raised 25c By New Rule

Traffic Violators To Be Put On Record

Its going to be more and more expensive for those who break the traffic laws in the state of Oregon. Attention of local enforcement officers has just been called to a provision of the law adopted by the last legislature which provides that the ordinary costs of \$3.50 shall be increased to \$3.75.

The extra quarter will be used to pay for the labor of the Justice or police judge, who will from now on be required to make a report on every traffic violation to Secretary of State Kozor.

Thus a record will be established which will be of use when it is desired to revoke the license of some driver who is shown to be a consistent and deliberate violator of traffic and speed rules.

Whether this move is the forerunner of a move to bar those from the

roads who don't know how to use them could not be learned here.
