Approve Plans for New Normal School

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 1.—Plans for the southern Oregon normal school at Ashland were approved by the building commission of the board of regents of state normal schools late yesterday.

Plans approved include a two story and basement building, 62x

156 feet, concrete, stucco finish and tile roof. The building will include 16 rooms, registrar's and president's office, library, reference room seating 400 students. The estimated cost is \$160,000. The legislature appropriated \$175,000 for its construction and equipment. Bids will be opened in about six weeks.

Can Not Break Up Community Fair Exhibits

Some misunderstanding seems to exist in the minds of some of the donors of display material for community exhibits that individual displays composing part of a community booth can be taken down and exhibited as individual entries in grains, grasses, vegetables or other classes. This would be manifestly unfair as the Fair Board made a special \$50 award for community exhibit which is the full length of the display pavilion from the farm crops exhibit and to take out individual entries from a community display to take them to the proper divisions where individuals desire to show their own produce would destroy the community display. Community gatherings which go to make a community booth cannot be judged as individual entries and exhibitors are asked to bring their individual entries to the various classes of farm produce, as they were entering independently of any community display and place them in their proper divisions.

SECOND AND 3RD PAVING LAYER IS LAID TODAY
