

Bend Man Is Bound Over on Charge of Larceny of Cattle

BEND, Ore., Sept. 1.—William McKinley, charged with larceny of a steer belonging to Edward Gould, yesterday was bound over to the grand jury by E. D. Gillson, Justice of the Peace. Yannis (Punk) Robinson and Ralph Whaley, jointly charged with McKinley in the complaint signed by Gould, have not been served with warrants on the Gould charge, but are awaiting grand jury investigation having been bound over on a calf stealing charge signed by Kenneth Thompson, Crook county cattleman. Each of the three men are held under \$2500 bail which has not been furnished.

Salmon Run on in Rogue River Near Grants Pass

Those who have read "The Silver Horde" by Rex Beach and have wanted to visualize a run of salmon such as is pictured there will have the opportunity the end of this week or the first of the coming week, as one of the greatest runs of salmon in recent years is now in the upper river and is expected to reach Grants Pass in four or five days.

Yesterday Frank Carpenter, who conducts the store at Galice, came to the city and reported that the river is alive with big fellow below Hell's Gate, about 15 miles down the river from this city. It is estimated that the salmon have been averaging about six miles a day on their journey to the headwaters of the Rogue and this will bring them here toward the end of the week.

The present run has been described as being composed of salmon which average about 30 pounds to the fish. H. C. Seymour, state club leader, was at Gold Beach Friday and saw great piles of salmon at the Macleay cannery, the fish being exceptionally uniform in size.

These big fellows yesterday were churning the river below Hell's Gate, the riffles seeming to be alive with them. Fishermen at the mouth reported great numbers of steelheads ascending the river with the salmon and anglers are getting their rods and tackle in shape to stand the strain of the big fellows.

A few salmon have been seen on the river near Grants Pass recently, these being the vanguard of hosts to follow.

It has been years since a huge run of salmon has been seen on the upper Rogue and local people are looking forward with great anticipation. Yesterday a number of people made the trip down the river to see them.

The run at the mouth is still continuing, according to advices from Gold Beach and this means that they will continue to pass along the upper river for several weeks.—Grants Pass Courier.

Training School Contract Awarded

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 1.—The building committee of the board of regents of state normal schools this afternoon tentatively awarded to George F. Reeves of Portland, a contract for construction of a training school building at Independence, to be part of the state normal

school, which is located at Monmouth, two miles away. Reeves' bid was \$79,880 of \$10,561 lower than the next lowest bid. The award is subject to the board's approval of Reeves' sub-contractors.

The committee awarded the heating and ventilating contract for the same building to Rush-light, Haastorf and Lord, of Portland, whose bid was \$15,973, and the plumbing contract to Sturges and Sturges, of Portland, at a big of \$5,872.

The contract for electrical wiring will not be awarded until a further study of the bids has been made by the committee.

The committee will this afternoon examine architects drawings for the normal school building at Ashland. If the plans are approved bids will be opened in six weeks.
