Mythical Babies Duped Trio of Prominent Bay Men, Says Mother

HAD REGULAR INCOME

Mother of Bessie Ferguson Loren Makes Startling Admission

OAKLAND, Calif., Sept. 3. (A.P.)—Investigation into the murder of Bessie Ferguson Loren, Oakland nurse, took a sensational turn with the statement last night by Under Sheriff W. M. Veale of Contra Costa county that he had obtained from Mrs. Anna Ferguson, Bessie's mother, an admission that for several years and almost up to the time of her daughter's disappearance on August 19, Bessie had regularly received money from at least three men whose names previously had been brought into the case.

Under Sheriff Veale said Mrs. Ferguson mentioned the names of an Oakland physician, an Oakland dentist and a San Francisco accountant and former employer of Bessie Ferguson. Re-questioning of all three will be taken as a result of Mrs. Ferguson's latest disclosures. Under Sheriff Veale said.

Was Not a Mother

Under Sheriff Veale said Mrs. Ferguson told him she was positive that Bessie never had been a mother, as indicated in letters and telegrams found among the dead woman's effects.

Veale learned from Mrs. Ferguson, however, that her daughter collected regular monthly payments from several men for the support of three mythical children.

Gives Names of Men

"The mother told me," said Veale, "that her daughter had derived a regular income for years in this fashion from men who believed themselves to be fathers of children that never existed."

Gordon Rowe, San Francisco accountant Dr. J. L. Loran Pease, Oakland dentist, and Dr. J. J. Moyer, Oakland physician, were the persons named by Mrs. Ferguson from whom the payments were received, Veale declared.

PRICE OF MILK IN PORTLAND RISES

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 3.—Lack of pasture and the necessity of feeding cows high priced feeds led yesterday to an advance of one cent in milk prices by nearly all the milk producers here.

The new prices will range from 11 to 15 per quart.

Baby Shoes Should Be Fitted Correctly

Infants eventually need shoes. They should be nice, soft, pliable. When the tiny baby begins to pull itself by her feet and struggles to walk—she needs some protection for the sole of the feet. She does not need support for the ankles, as so many mothers think, and with a mistaken idea buy tight, stiff, heavy-soled shoes which cramp the toes and act as crutches to her ankles.

Nature has furnished the baby with five toes so they may spread out and give balance. Also, an intricate beautiful network of muscles and small bones so the body will be supported in any position. First shoes should be soft-soled moccasins which allow free play to the feet and adequate exercise to the muscles.

This principle should be kept in mind for the older child. Flat heeled shoes with toes which follow the natural line of the feet, and above all a straight inside line which will give the feet a chance to develop as nature intended, to grow as beautiful and characteristic as the hand, instead of ugly and distorted and full of aches and pains.

It is a mistake to think one must fit the shoe over-large. An over-large shoe throws the foot out of position, encouraging all the foot poths, callouses, corns, bunions and flat feet.
