REPORT OF CROP
OUTLOOK GIVEN

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 4.—The
summary of crop conditions in Ore-
gon for the week ending September
1, issued by the United States de-
partment of agriculture, follows:
Cool nights prevailed generally,
but moderately high daytime tem-
peratures were the rule in eastern
and southern counties most of the
week, and over practically the en-
tire state in the closing days. Some
light rain occurred in northwestern
counties. There was a noticeable
decrease in relative humidity to-
ward the close of the week, but no
serious outbreaks of forest fires
were reported.

Cereals: Little small grain re-
mains to be harvested, and thresh-
ing has made good progress. Corn
has been somewhat improved by
rain, but in some sections has suf-
fered considerably from drought.
Cutting of corn for ensilage is in
progress. Seeding of winter wheat
and barley is in progress in Wasco
county. More rain is needed for
fall plowing and seeding.

Fruits: Picking of prunes, peach-
es, pears, and evergreen black ber-
ries is in progress. In some local-
ities apples have been benefitted by
rain.

Meadows, pastures, and ranges:
Cutting of the third crop of alfalfa
is nearing completion in the warmer
districts. Water for irrigation of
late hay crops is lacking in some of
the small crops. Pastures and
ranges are showing some improve-
ment since the recent rains, but
more rain is needed.

Livestock: Domestic stock in some
localities continues to show the ef-
fect of short pasturage. Range
stock is mostly in good condition.
Movement of range lambs to mark-
et continues active.

Miscellaneous: Late potatoes and
garden truck have been helped by
rain in many places, but some late
potatoes, which had partially rip-
ened during the drought, are start-
ing new growth. Melons and to-
matos are generally plentiful. Pick-
ing of the main hop crop is under
way. Broccoli is growing good.

MEMORY OF BILL NYE TO BE
HONORED BY NORTH CAROLINA

FLETCHER, N. C. (P)—Five
memorials to Edgar Wilson (Bill)
Nye, grouped about his last resting
place in the heart of the Blue Ridge
mountains near Fletcher, were for-
mally dedicated Tuesday, August 25.
These reminders of the famous hu-
morist include a memorial window
in old Calvary Episcopal church a
bronze tablet marking his grave in
the churchyard; a monument on
which a bronze tablet will tell a brief
story of his life, on the Henderson-
ville Asheville highway; a memorial
flagstaff, the gift of the city of Ash-
ville and a memorial shelter, erected
by the Masonic fraternity of Ash-
ville.

Dedicatory exercises over these
memorials will mark the 75th anni-
versary of the humorist's birth at
Shirley, Maine, Frank W. Nye, son of
the humorist, and Mrs. Eugene Parr,
a daughter, will be present.
