County Health During August Best Reported

Report of Widespread Epidemic is Dis- counted

Not since he has assumed his position as county health officer have general health conditions been so good in Klamath as during August, is the succinct summary by Doctor G. S. Newsom of his monthly report to the state health department.

Since the first of July there have been six cases of scarlet fever in Klamath county.

In no sense is there any epidemic prevailing in Klamath, Dr. Newsom pointed out, and in support of this statement, pointed to the few cases of infectious diseases during the past 35 days.

Social diseases were the most serious during August, it developed. Dr. Newsom pointed out that the social disease menace in Klamath was a real one and should be given serious attention.

Following is the narrative report of the health officer:

Narrative survey during the month of the outlying districts of county water samples, sent to laboratory from each district. Most of the industrial camps of the county are located on the National forest reserve and are under the supervision of that department.

"Baby and pre-school clinics were held in the Henley district. This concludes a series of six such clinics held in the county during the summer. Much literature was distributed and advice given. These clinics created much interest among parents and brought the unit in close contact with the people of the county. Physicians of the county materially assisted in the physical examination and other work of the unit.

"Three cases of smallpox were reported and quarantined during the month. Infection traced to Omaha, Nebraska. Contacts were vaccinated.

"One case of typhoid was reported. Investigation indicates the infection was received while away on a vacation trip.

"Five cases of scarlet fever were reported and quarantined during the month. One death resulted from scarlet fever.

"Nurses of unit have visited public gatherings in the investigation of whooping cough.

"Water samples sent to the state laboratory from the different rural school districts supplied by wells in the effort to assure a good water supply at the beginning of the school year."
