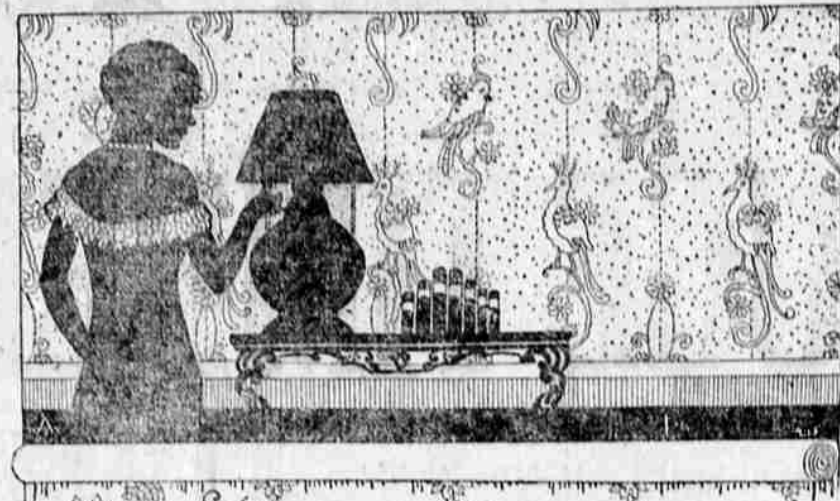
Misses Anna and Olive Hill spent Saturday in Klamath Falls.
