EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 5.—First prosecutions in the state under the amendment passed at the last session of the legislature to the working men's compensation law, wherein any one about to engage in a hazardous occupation must first notify the state accident commission, were conducted here yesterday. W. J. and J. L. Lepley pleaded guilty and were fined \$25 each. The men were in charge of the construction of a bank in Spring-
