wards when we went over the ground again he showed me a basin where he said he had helped Murphy wash his face. Considerable stress was laid on failure of Way to locate the tracks of his horse which he said were made when he rode his horse in a southerly direction from the Murphy sheep camp.

Tracks Not Seen

"I could not locate the tracks of the horses," Sheriff Hawkins said. "Right close to the camp, it would have been impossible because of the ground being trampled up by sheep. But then Way and I spent some time on an adjoining hill over which he was supposed to have gone and we could not find the tracks of his horse."

Other state witnesses called to testify this morning were Dr. J. G. Patterson, who attended to Murphy before his death and performed the autopsy after Dr. Patterson and also Dr. George Merryman, testified that death had come from a fractured skull that caused a hemorrhage of the brain. Strenuous objections were lodged against the attempt of the state to secure their testimony as to what in the opinion of the two physicians could have caused the fracture. Judge Layvitt declined to rule on questions until this afternoon.

Lloyd Waives Formal Trial SALEM, Ore., Sept. 9.—W. R. Lloyd, former convict in the Oregon state prison who is alleged to have shot and killed C. I.
