Oregon Trunk President May Be Here Soon

O. T. Attorney is Coming to Klamath Next Week

It is possible that W. F. Turner, president of the Oregon Trunk railroad, will accompany Charles F. Hart, attorney of that line, on a visit to Klamath Falls next week, local rail officials admitted today.

Mr. Hart is coming here for the purpose of making further arrangements concerning the railroad hearing on the Northern line extension from Bend to Klamath Falls. He will interview witnesses who will appear before the interstate commerce commission examiner in Portland, October 5, and submit their testimony.

The Northern lines are drawing their witnesses from the lumber men, livestock men, farmers and business men, who would be immediately affected by the construction of the new line. Their theory, it was explained, is to have not more than one or two representatives from each industry in Klamath to testify in their support at the hearing.

With Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, Mr. Hart was a visitor in Klamath Falls several weeks ago to interview prospective witnesses.

British Earl To Lose Title

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10. (AP)—Oliver Henry Wallop, who has become Earl of Portsmouth as a result of the death of his brother, is practically certain to lose the American citizenship he now holds by naturalization when he accepts the British title.

Officials of the bureau of naturalization, through refusing today to pass judgment on the case in advance of formal presentation, pointed to the statute which automatically divests any American of United States citizenship when he taken an oath of allegiance to a foreign government. It is understood unofficially that Mr. Wallop must take such an oath in assuming the earlship.

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 10.—Ed Sedgwick's company of the Universal Pictures corporation will return to Pendleton Saturday to complete the filming of "Under Western Skies" during the round-up. PHILLIES STILL FIGHT FOR LEAD

Two Successive Victories Over Senators Kindle Their Hopes Again

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Two successive victories over the world champion Senators have rekindled Philadelphia hopes in the American league camp.

The hopes are based on slight mathematical chances, however. Although they are still trailing by seven games, the Athletics have pulled an even break out of the series with the Senators and their lethargy which extended through 12 losing games is ended.

The Macks came out of a free-hitting game yesterday on the long end of a 9 to 7 score, totalling 15 safeties off three Washington hurlers. Four pitchers were used by Philadelphia, Baumgartner finishing as the winning twirler.

The only other American league game the Yankees bowed before the Red Sox, 5 to 4. Babe Ruth hung up a pair of doubles and two singles in four times at bat and drove in three of the New York runs.

Mark Koenig, recruit from the St. Paul American association was established himself at short with the Yankees, replacing Peewee Wanninger.

Pittsburgh dropped the final game of a series to the Cubs 9 to 7, after an eleven inning fray. The set-back reduced the lead of the Pirates over the Giants to seven and one half games. Other clubs in the national league were not scheduled.

Railroad Wants To Discontinue

MEDFORD, Ore., Sept. 10.—H. H. Corey, T. R. Campbell and S. H. Hauser, members of the state public service commission, heard evidence here today concerning the request of M. V. Barnum, that he be allowed to abandon his railroad from Medford to Jacksonville, and sell the equipment. The request was opposed by residents of Jacksonville and the Medford chamber of commerce. At the close of the hearing, Corey announced that the matter would be taken under advisement for 15 days.
