**Ben Dey Wants Coos Bay Help In Rail Scrap**

**S. P. Representative Appears Before Business Men**

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 12.—The support of Coos Bay in the carrying out of the Southern Pacific building program of the east-west project, in which the company is spending \$38,000,000, and which is said to prove of benefit to Coos Bay in the reduction of the eastern route by 230 miles and only possible by the exclusion of other lines in Southern Oregon, was urged at a luncheon yesterday to state businessmen of Marshfield and North Bend by Southern Pacific officials.

Ben C. Dey, general counsel of the Southern Pacific lines, presented the plan of the road in the building program and the reasons why the Oregon Trunk line should not be permitted by the I. C. C. to build from Bend south to Klamath Falls, thus dividing the traffic, all of which Southern Pacific officials claim is needed by the Southern Pacific in order to carry out its program.

The plan of R. H. Corey to force the Union Pacific to build a line directly east through the deserts and unproductive territory was assailed by Dey as an idle dream. However,

he said, granting that Corey's plan be feasible, it would take ten years of litigation to force such a line.
