Out of 100 letters received this morning, only four were against the proposition of leaving off the "Falls" and have the city known as just "Klamath."

The suggestion of dropping the latter half of the name of the city, found its source in the Rotary club and was quickly taken up by the chamber of commerce. If the final returns from the chamber membership show a sufficient majority supporting the change, the matter will be taken before the city council.
